Jury Took Two Ballots Before Arriving at a Unanimous Decision.

VERDICT CAME AT 10:30 P. M.

One of the First Men to Congratulate The Defendant Was District Attorney Halverson.

(Special to the "News") Ogden, Dec 21 .- At 10 o'vlock last night the jury in the Walker trial brought in a verdict of "not guilty," Fred C Walker the defendant was in the courtroom and for the first time since September his face bore a happy expression. He contraced his white heired mother sitting near him and after receiving congratulations from those standing around, shook hands with

each of the jurers. The freed man was so full of gratiinde that he appeared as a youngstar with a new toy, so large and bright as to seem an impossibility; he seemed to be saying, "I'm free. Am I free? I am free-free-free!"

SWEARS BY PARTNER

"What will I do?" he said turning to a bystander who had put the ques-tion. "Oh, I am-I don't know. Of course I am going to stay with Law-rence until he gots bis freedom. How can I ever thank you all and the others and the press who have been so square and fair through it all!" and fair through it all!" Some one in the room mentioned Christmas. Walker turned with a smile, "It's to be a merry Christmas after all isn't it?" As he spoke tears ran down his cheeks but the smile on his face made him appear a differ-ent man from the down-cast fellow who winced and stooped during fre-quent portions of the trial.
