

## PARIS POLICE MAKE ARRESTS.

Prisoners Charged With Complicity in Organizing Rebellions and Intriguing With Anarchists.

### ALSO IN OTHER FRENCH CITIES

Cartridges and Rations Issued to the Troops in Anticipation of May Day Troubles.

Paris, April 30.—The Paris police today arrested M. Griffeu, secretary of the general confederation of labor, the responsible organizer of the proposed May day demonstrations; M. Biberte, a newspaper man, and Maj. Poulant, a Bonapartist, formerly of the imperial guards. In addition, Count Durand de Beauregard was taken into custody at Nice. Arrests are also made at other places and warrants were issued for the arrests of M. Le, secretary of the confederation of labor, and M. Fromentin, a wealthy anarchist, both of whom were found to have fled from this city. All the prisoners are charged with complicity in organizing a rebellion and with intriguing with anarchists.

The arrests began early in the morning, the charges being based on papers seized during the recent police searches. Judge Andre summoned the police commissioners from the central districts, and directed each of them to proceed with a squad of police and make the arrests in various sections of the city. At the same time telegraphic orders were issued to proceed with arrests at Nice, Brest and other points. M. Griffeu, who is the principal labor leader, was found at his house and was taken into custody, his associate, Levy, was not located.

Count de Beauregard is the head of the supposed plot recently unearthed. Henri Biberte is editor of L'Autorite, a Bonapartist organ. Two additional warrants have been issued, but the names of the persons to be arrested will be withheld until they are in the hands of the police. Griffeu, Biberte and Poulant, after their preliminary examination, were taken to jail.

The men at the labor headquarters here are stunned by the arrests, especially as the managers of tomorrow's proposed demonstrations have withdrawn from further activity which is raising general discouragement in labor circles.

The government officials declare that the arrests will break the backbone of the violent element.

The strike centers outside of Paris are quiet.

M. Le Pine, the perfect of police, conferred during the day with the commanders of the troops and gave final instructions for the military occupation of main points in Paris beginning early Tuesday.

The troops will receive two packages of cartridges and two days' rations.

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## 'FRISCO EAGER FOR FOOD SHORTAGE

The Announcement of That Fact By Mayor Schmitz Causes Consternation.

### MERCENARY PEOPLE AT WORK

In Oakland They "Hog" Things—Signs of Renewal of Industry in Stricken City.

San Francisco, April 30.—A feeling akin to consternation was created at the meeting of the general municipal committee today when Mayor Schmitz stated that the city faced a shortage in the food supply. It had been the popular belief, and that of many officials also, that San Francisco, through the generous aid of the nation, had been placed in a position above want for a long time to come, and the mayor's declaration came in the nature of a painful surprise.

It was decided at a conference held today by Gov. Pardee, Congressman Kahn, Gen. Greely and Maj. Mott, that the distribution of relief supplies in Oakland should be also placed under military direction similar to that in vogue in San Francisco. Oakland being the nearest large place of refuge from this city, has been obliged to attend to the task of feeding and housing thousands of unfortunate people and it is stated that the same misuse of food by unscrupulous and mercenary persons has been unearthed there.

Today the plan of Gen. Greely for distributing food to people in want was commenced in a number of the newly-created districts and there was some diminution noticeable in the output of goods.

### SUPPLY DISTRESSINGLY SMALL.

With no immediate prospect that conditions will be so normalized that the community will be able to feed and take care of itself, the supply of food under hand is becoming distressingly small. No man connected with the relief affairs is willing to hazard an opinion as to when relief work may be abandoned. Yet Mayor Schmitz informed the general committee this morning that from information in his possession it appeared that 700 carloads of food and supplies of various descriptions had been distributed since the morning of the earthquake on April 18, and the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and other transportation lines had information of only 100 carloads on the way.

"It is correct," said the mayor, "this information is correct, and I have no reason to doubt it, we will soon be worse off than we were a week ago. If the information has gone abroad through the country that we are amply supplied, it is most unfortunate, for it is apparent that we are not. It is not even known how much money we can depend upon with which to purchase supplies, for you have heard from San Francisco that several occasions to report the names of the officers and enlisted men of the marine corps and army who displayed special gallantry checked in San Francisco by the use of dynamite with a view to reward and recommendation."

### CHAIRMAN PHELAN UNABLE TO CASH DRAFTS.

San Francisco, April 30.—At the meeting of the finance committee today Chairman Phelan announces that he had been unable to cash drafts amounting to \$40,000 in Oakland today, but that he had made arrangements with the sub-treasury to obtain the money tomorrow.

Dr. E. E. Baker, Frank Stratton and C. E. Brown of Oakland were added to the finance committee, so that the relief work in Oakland might be systematized. Dr. Ward, president of the board of health, reported that the sanitation of the city continued in excellent condition and that only a few cases of contagious diseases had been reported. The death rate was normal. Dr. Ward said that it had cost so far \$24,000 to move the garbage and dump it into the sea. Members of the national guard are not assisting the health inspectors in making examinations of houses in the residential district.

### FOOD FOR 15 DAYS.

Basing his calculations upon reports received within the past 24 hours, Gen. Greely stated this morning that the entire available food supply, including shipments on hand and those enroute, would be sufficient for the present population during a period of 15 days. This reckoning may be upon the rate at which supplies have been consumed since the fire. Under the army ration system that will hereafter prevail, Gen. Greely stated his belief that the same amount of food would last 21 days.

"Within the next 72 hours," said Gen. Greely, "we shall be obliged to deal with another very serious problem—the question of feeding all the bodied male adults. The difficulty will be to distinguish in the cases of clerks, stenographers, music teachers and others who are actually unable to return an equivalent for a day's wages in hard labor. The men who are able to work will have to find occupation as fast as it is presented."

Gen. Greely stated that Oakland would be placed upon the same basis as San Francisco in this respect, and that the various relief stations would possibly be taken over by army officers by tomorrow noon. Mayor Mott stated that there had been some diversions of good supplies from the channels intended but that these were not serious. Dr. D. E. Baker will assume charge of the distribution of supplies on behalf of the city of Oakland.

### UNFORTUNATE HAPPENING.

An unfortunate happening today was the destruction of a number of homes in the saved section on Van Ness avenue. The blasting gang was notified that certain houses were to be blown up, but that these were not serious. Dr. D. E. Baker will assume charge of the distribution of supplies on behalf of the city of Oakland.

### CALIFORNIA SUPREME COURT.

Will Meet Monday in Century Club Building, San Francisco.

San Francisco, April 30.—The supreme court of the state of California will meet next Monday, the regular law and motion day, in the Century club building, on Franklin street near Sutter, to hold the court and transact the business of the court.

The highest tribunal of the state are kept in triplicate, copies being sent to Los Angeles and Sacramento from here and vice versa, as they are filed. As a result the supreme court has lost only three records that were filed about 10 days prior to the fire. Copies will be sent to this city at once.

### HEARST ASKS FEDERAL AID FOR 'FRISCO SUFFERERS.

Washington, April 30.—This was both a field and a "hot" day in the house, the major portion of the legislative session being given over to the consideration of the agricultural bill and incidentally to the free distribution of seeds, for which the bill does not provide, but which it is agreed to restore to the bill.

Immediately after the approval of the journal Mr. Olmsted (Pennsylvania) presented a resolution of thanks on behalf of the people of the United States to Gen. Horace Porter, late ambassador to France, for his untiring efforts to discomfit and disband the body of Admiral John Paul Jones. The resolution was unanimously adopted with a further resolution that Gen. Porter be invited to deliver at Annapolis on the occasion of the interment of the body of America's first admiral should be printed in the Congressional Record and made a congressional document.

Eighteen pages of the agricultural bill were considered and perfected. The debate on the question of free seeds will be resumed tomorrow, when a vote is expected to be taken on the passage of an appropriation of \$50,000 for the purchase and distribution of "rare and unusual seeds."

A resolution was given to the house today by Representative Hearst (New York) appropriating \$250,000 additional for the California earthquake and fire sufferers.

The wording of the resolution is as follows: "That the secretary of war be and he is hereby authorized and directed to procure in the open market or otherwise additional supplies for the relief of the destitute persons and sufferers from the recent earthquake and fire in the state of California, and to issue the same to such persons as are in needy circumstances as a result of the earthquake and fire, and in executing this resolution the secretary of war is directed, so far as is practicable, to expend the sum herein appropriated wholly within the state of California, so that the people of that state shall have the whole benefit of the appropriation and the greatest speed be given to the execution of the act."

"Resolved, That to enable the secretary of war to execute this joint resolution, in addition to the sum heretofore appropriated for this purpose, there be hereby appropriated the sum of \$250,000, to be expended under the direction of the secretary of war."

San Francisco, April 30.—San Francisco is to build a new city hall at once, a temporary structure, but one which will do away with the necessity of paying the high rent rates which the owners of property available for municipal use are inclined to charge. A site which is looked upon favorably is the Lincoln school property on the corner of Market and Fifth streets. It is proposed to erect the temporary building of corrugated iron on steel frame and to house in it all the city offices, as it will be practically fireproof.
