## WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 29.8 inches; temperature at 6 a. m., 31°; maximum temperature, 34°; minimum temperature, 27°; degree of mean temperature, 29°; which is 11 degrees below normal.

Total excess of the daily mean temperature since the first of the month, 56 degrees.

Accumulated excess of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 61 degrees.

Total precipitation for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m., .41 inch.

Total precipitation since the first of the month, 2.16 inches, which is .71 inch above the normal.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Utah, Idaho, Colorado, California, New Mexico, Oregon, Washington, Nebraska, Missouri, Illinois, Minnesota, and the British possessions. It was raining this morning at San Francisco and Roseburg.

Thunderstorms were reported at Chicago and St. Louis.

The temperature changes were unimportant except a fall of 16 degrees or more over portions of the Rocky mountain slope, and the Missouri valley. The temperature was below zero over portions of Montana, and the British northwest territory.

At this morning's meeting of the Ministerial association, Rev. J. C. Lincoln, assistant pastor of the First Presbyterian church, read a paper on Korea, in which he showed the advance of missionary enterprise, and claimed that in the last 15 years 20,000 Koreans have been converted to evangelical faiths.

Roy Wright and Arthur Rocco, the two young men arrested for attempting to rob Miss Edna Ellingson Saturday night last, were arraigned before Judge Diehl this morning on the charge of attempted robbery. They pleaded not guilty and their hearing was set for next Saturday morning. In default of bonds, they were remanded to the county jail.

The office of the board of public works has been moved across the hall in the city and county building, with the clerk of the civil division of the city court. The offices of the land and water commissioner and of the plumbing inspector have been moved from the same room in with the board of health. The room thus vacated will be used in the near future by the public library.

Mr. Porter has entirely regained his health, which was uncertain when he left, and now feels as well as he ever did in his life. He says the recent rainfalls in southern California have been so heavy that all fears of drought are at an end, and the season's outlook is as promising as might be desired.
