Visitor from Klondike—Child Poisoned—Wedding Belts.

Provo City, August 6.—Mrs. Nellie Vincent-Yenger, after an absence of five years in the Klondike, returned to Provo on a visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Vincent, and after spending a few weeks in Provo will return to the frozen North in the fall as she is well pleased with the country and likes it a home.

September 1, 1885, Mrs. Yeager left her Utah home and headed north to the Klondike where she has been ever since. Last year she was invited to him upon her arrival and has since passed through all the hardships pertaining to the life of a prospector in that wild country. With her husband she walked 1,200 miles over the Chilcotin pass, paying the Indian packers 25 cents per pound for carrying their provisions and supplies.

## LITTLE CHILD POISONED.

On Sunday afternoon the thirteen-month-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Black of this city in some way secured a bottle of bed-hung poison and before it was noticed had taken some of the stuff into its stomach and was soon in convulsions. The little one was taken to Dr. Allen's office where the doctor worked over two hours and pronounced the child out of apparent danger, although the child is very sick and weak from the effects of the poison.

## COUNTY AFFAIRS.

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## MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS.

The city council held their regular session this evening.

Arrangement of the water works department was authorized to employ one additional man to look after these works. It was voted to make the water in an unlawful manner such as watering lawns by an open hose, allowing hydrants to run open, etc., and to cut off from the system all such parties.

The committee on public grounds and city property reported upon the fire chief's petition for a new stable and recommended that inasmuch as the city finances would not permit the building of a new stable this year that the old stable be retained. Adopted.

The regular salaries were allowed as were a large batch of claims.

## DEATH OF A CHILD.

The infant and only child of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Young died Saturday evening at Provo, where they had removed from Provo only two weeks ago. The funeral services were held at the home of John Footh of the city.

Twenty-nine officers and men wrote to the police department for the scratch, brushes, cuts, wounds, sore feet and stiff joints, buckled arms, aches and pains in the side, rheumatism, etc.

## FARMINGTON.

Davis County Affairs—Tax Levy of Five Mills.

Farmington, Davis Co., Aug. 4.—At the regular session of the board of county commissioners held today, the following business was transacted:

The offer of the R. G. W. Ry. to put in a road crossing near Hay Station in this county was accepted; the county will do the grading necessary to be done.

Wm. N. Atkinson having failed to qualify as road supervisor of road district No. II, I. H. Barlow was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Elmer Hinckley was appointed justice of the peace of Cedar Fort, vice Joseph Wilcox, resigned.

County Attorney Evans was authorized to compromise with the Telluride Power Transmission Co. the claim of the county against them for the damage of the public highways in Provo canyon at \$40.

W. M. McKendrick asked for \$25 as a balance due on the funeral expenses of Mrs. Thomas Flynn. Referred to Mr. Evans and voted to act.

McKendrick's administration was received from Mr. Christensen and 30 others protesting against the changing of the county seat near Salem, leading to the mouth of Spanish Fork canyon, alleging that the new route was a dangerous one. Taken under advisement.

## ARRESTED AND AMPUTATED.

W. O. Bishop, a Southern Pacific brakeman, while coupling a car from a passenger train, was caught in between the two cars and his right arm was crushed. The boy, in company with some playmates, was playing ball near his home on Thirty-first street. Young boy was battoning the ball, it was thrown swiftly to him and struck him on the temple, breaking a small blood vessel. He thought nothing special or unusual, and continued playing for about an hour, when his head began aching, so went to the home, and during the evening his wife became alarmed. Then he was placed on the bed, and his wife never spoke a word. The blood oozed inwardly and clotted in the brain, causing his death. The funeral services, it is expected, will be held tomorrow.
