CIVIL SERVICE

Commission Announces Special Examination for Clerks and Examiners.

Secretary Williams of the local civil service commission has received notice from Washington that residents of the District of Columbia and states and territories that have received their full share of appointments under the appointment act, notified that they will not be certified for appointment from this examination so long as there are satisfactory eligibles in the same subject who are residents of states and territories that are not in excess who will accept appointment.

The following states have at this time received their full share of appointments in the appointed offices: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Kansas, Maryland, Maine, Nevada, New Hampshire, Ohio, Vermont, Virginia, Wyoming and the District of Columbia.

The civil service commission announces a special examination for the purpose of establishing a suitable register of eligibles for clerks and examiners. It is expected that a number of additional positions of this kind, provided by Congress for the United States civil service commission, will be filled on July 1. Probably 100 or more vacancies will be filled if eligibles with suitable qualifications are secured. This examination will be given on April 21 and succeeding dates in the spring schedule of examinations.

This examination is open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements, and offers excellent prospects of appointment to clerks employed in various offices of the government and other places where rapid and accurate clerical work must be done, and to persons whose education and experience would tend to qualify them for some of the examining work of the commission, and for scientific or technical work in other offices.

Competitors will be rated without regard to consideration other than the qualifications shown on the examination papers, and eligibles will be certified strictly in accordance with the service laws and rules. The age limits are 20 years and over. Preference in appointment will be given to eligibles under 40. The examination will be restricted to those who are in sound physical condition, and applicants will be required to furnish a medical certificate showing that they have no physical defects.

CONTAGION DECREASING

Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria and Smallpox on the Wane.

For the week ending March 28, the health report to the board of health numbered 46, 6 of males and 20 of the female gender. For the same period the deaths reported were 18, 14 males and 4 females. One body was brought here for interment and 2 shipped away.

At the close of last report there were 11 cases of scarlet fever, in detention. No new cases were reported, and 3 have been released, left 10 cases in quarantine, as compared with 27 for the corresponding week of last year. There were 21 cases of diphtheria held over from last week; during the week 4 new cases were reported, 13 recovered and 4 cases died of diphtheria and its complications, leaving 10 cases in the city against 10 for the same week of last year. Eighteen new cases of smallpox developed during the week, 9 being in families already in quarantine; the remainder being the result of exposure at various places. During the week 34 cases recovered, leaving 11 cases in the city and detention hospital, as against 57 for the week preceding. Of other cases reported to be reported, there were 3 of typhoid fever and 3 of chicken pox.
