McKNIGHT—ALEXANDER—At Jamestown, on the island of St. Helena, South Atlantic Ocean, in the Episcopal Church of St. James, by the Rev. Dr. Henderson, on the 28th day of August, 1882, Mr. James A. McKnight, of U. S. Consul, son of J. McKnight, Esq., of this city, and Miss Lydia C. Alexander, of Jamestown.

The nuptials were honored with the Governor's salute from one of the batteries; the whole population turned out to witness the ceremonies, and what was intended by the parties to be a quiet and unassuming ceremony, was transformed into an exciting and brilliant affair.

OBITUARY.

George Washington Edwards was born July 8, 1834, in Adams County, Illinois; he died in Panama, Sept. 28, 1882, of general debility, superinduced by a long siege of internal leucalgia, from which he suffered severely during the last 15 years.

He was an active pioneer in his younger days. Having arrived in Utah some thirty years ago, along with his father, Elias Edwards, they went to Tooele and settled, there being few settlers who had preceded them. It was only those early settlers who can fully realize the amount of privation and hardship that were endured. While he was a resident of Tooele County he was ordained a member of the forty-third Quorum of seventies.

In the month of April, 1859, he was married in Salt Lake City to Electra Jane Lee, daughter of Francis C. and Jane V. Lee, from whence the young couple started on their marriage journey to the arid desert, there to make a home for themselves, which place was then beginning to come to the front as being a desirable location to settle in.

In Wellsville the arduous labors of making a home were passed through, two little strangers of the male sex were added to their number, when in the fall of 1862 they were called to proceed to Utah's Dixie to strengthen the cords of that State in the stupendous undertaking of conquering the dry desert and the alkali bottoms to fruitful fields. Having resided in the Clara settlement about a year, he with a few others was called to move to Clover Valley and locate a settlement. The brethren leaving their families, proceeded to fill their mission, built houses and made other necessary improvements preparatory to moving their families in the following spring. The hardy pioneers of Clover Valley experienced many troubles and hardships from the Indians surrounding them, and what with guarding property, watching and fighting Indians, the constitution of the deceased was greatly injured and seeds of disease were sown which have now resulted in the destruction of the life of the body.

In the fall of 1865, he and family moved to Panacea, Meadow Valley—Francis C. Lee and family having located there the year previously. Here he made another home and found rest and opportunity to pursue the quiet avocations of life. He was a kind husband and watchful father, taking great interest in the welfare of his family. Eight children have been born to him, seven of whom survive. The four elder boys are well grown and fully able to attend to the interests of their mother and the rest of the family. They are well disposed young men and give great promise of becoming good and honorable citizens.

Sometime previous to his death Brother Edwards felt satisfied that his dissolution was fast approaching, but, like all others who have the faith or the fullness of the Gospel death had no terrors, he talked placidly of the change and realized that he only passed the veil a little before many of his associates here, and looked forward in full faith to the realization of that glorious meeting with wife, children and friends in the glorious hereafter, when mortality will be swallowed up in immortality and eternal life.

The last rites of esteem were appropriately

attended to by a large concourse of our citizens, and his remains were quietly laid away to await a glorious resurrection.—*COM.*

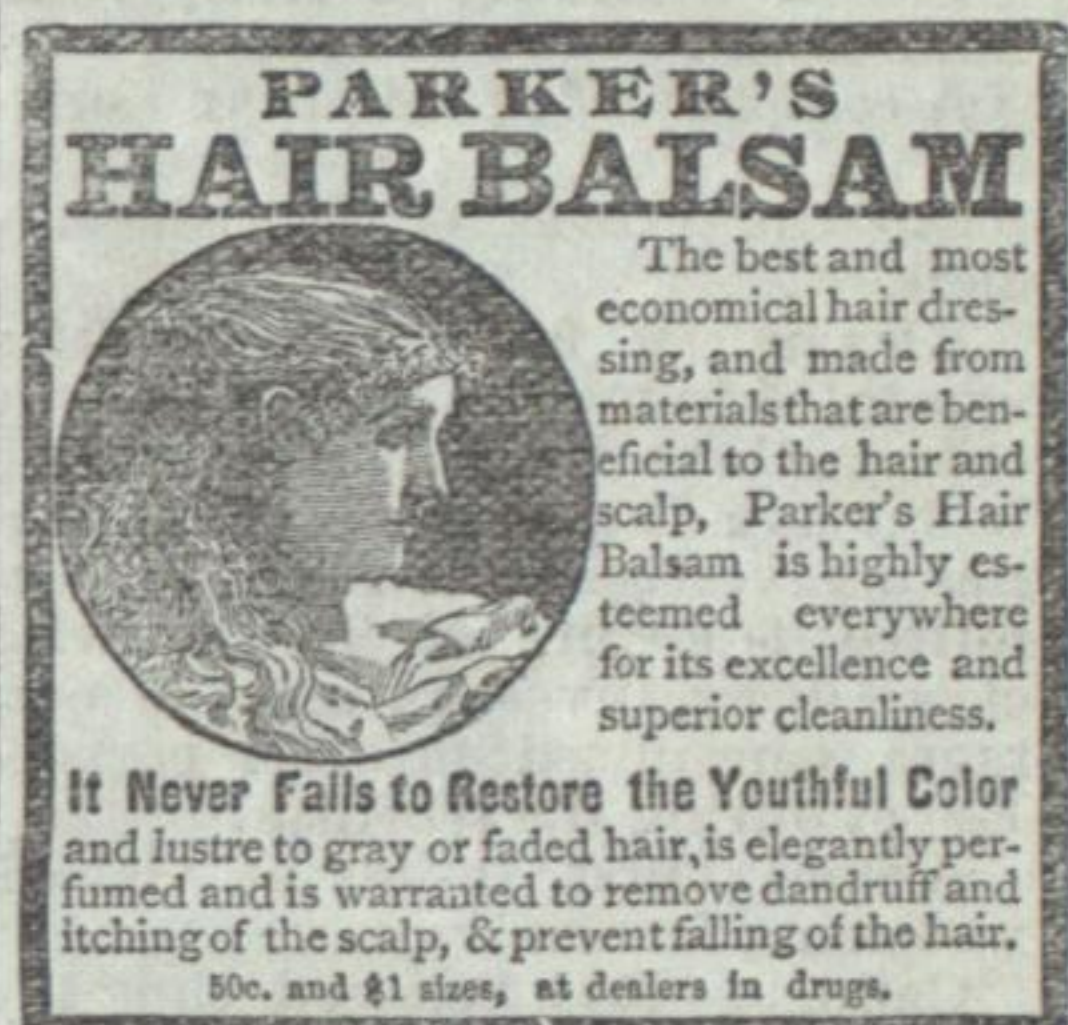
