MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Cahn and Noble Named as Fire and Police Commissioners.

CUTTING DOWN THE POLICE FORCE.

Proposition to Sell Apparatus from the Fire Department and Reduce the Number of Men.

The City Council met in regular session last night, and, promptly at 7:30 was called in order by President Newell.

W. P. Noble and Louis Cahn were elected members of the fire and police board, to serve for the next two years.

The election was brought up under the head of miscellaneous business by Whinney, who named Samuel Paul, architect of police, for the position. Then Romsey presented the name of Louis Cahn.

President Newell named W. P. Noble and Alice James W. Ure. The voting resulted as follows:

Allene—Cahn, 10; Ure, 10; Paul, 10; Whinney—Cahn and Ure, Dale—Cahn and Noble, Bush—Cahn and Noble, Johnson—Cahn and Noble, Hayward—Paul and Ure, Le Prohn—Paul and Noble, Morris—Cahn and Noble, Newell—Cahn and Noble, Whinney—Paul and Noble, Newell—Paul and Noble, Russell—Noble, 10; Cahn, 8; Paul, 7; Ure, 5.

President Newell then declared Morris, Noble and Cahn the choices of the Council for the positions named.

TO CUT DOWN THE POLICE FORCE.

The following ordinance was passed reducing the number of men on the police force:

It is ordained by the city Council of Salt Lake City, State of Utah, that the police department of Salt Lake City shall consist of a corps of police and fire commissioners, a chief and sergeant of police, two desk sergeants and twenty-eight patrolmen.

That it shall be duty of the head of fire and police commissions to make out the approval of the police department, to determine the number of officers and men to reduce the force of said department to the number designated by section 1 of the ordinance.

All the members voted in favor of it with exception of O'Meara.

ENGINEERS REPORT.

A communication was received from City Engineer Young, asking permission to employ the following persons to work by the day or some time out as they may be wanted, to be absolutely necessary: One functionary (who will furnish his own instrument) to have charge of said party and to assist in office in carrying out the plans of the engineer, at the rate of \$12 per day, one engineer to receive \$12 per day, two typists to receive \$12 each per day; and Wagons when needed at \$1. Two laboring men were asked to help in moving the engine, to cost \$1.50 each per day, and \$1 for the team per day.

Referred to the committee on finance.

WATERWORKS EXPENSES.

J. B. Dwyer, of the waterworks department filed a statement of pay rolls during the month of January to the amount of \$2,000.00. Filed.

SEWER INSPECTOR.

The board of public works asked permission to employ an engineer at \$12 per day to inspect sewer work.

Referred to the committee on finance.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BLAZER.

The following communication was received from the Mayor:

Gentlemen—I recommend dispensing with and, if possible, selling the aerial truck now in use at the fire department; also the three horses used in connection therewith. I do not believe the aerial truck, as I use it, has never, has never been used at any fire in this city. If we dispense with the truck and horses, as suggested, we can also dispense with the aerial ladder, which is not wanted, also two men at the West Side engine house, without impairing the efficiency of the service.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Petitions and communications were disposed of as follows:

A petition was received from H. W. Gandy, asking to be allowed to repair and re-occupy the entrance doors of the city and county building, joint building committee.

A communication was received signed by M. J. Thomas and twenty others, asking that the city consider its action in relation to salaries of employees of the fire department.

An invitation was extended to the chairman of the Young Men's Improvement League this evening. Accepted with thanks.

A petition was received from M. T. Rice company, bakers, asking for a refund of twenty thousand dollars to the city.

The committee on revision recommended that the rules of the old model be used for the present with the exception of rule 16 which provides that all rules must be changed by a majority vote of one-half the members or two-thirds majority vote of one-half the members or by a two-thirds vote of the members present. Adopted.

The council decided to postpone action on the report for one week.

number of officers and men, of which the police department shall consist, is as follows:

Section 1: Be it ordained by the City Council that the police department shall consist of a board of police and fire commissioners, a chief and sergeant of police, two desk sergeants, and 28 additional officers and men.

The bill was read the third time and passed without change.

O'Meara then moved the following:

Motion, It is the custom among the heads and employees of the several departments in private employments, when leaving their place of employment, to leave their names and whereabout they resided, and to see the State become's upright people in the midst of the Rocky mountains."
