SELLING BABIES.

GLIMPSE AT THE DARK SIDE OF ADVANCED CIVILIZATION.

The fact that hundreds of foundlings are now cared for at the expense of the city and by our numerous private charitable institutions is very generally taken as a leavening of the atmosphere of gross immorality in New York. Because the census of child asylums and nurseries is constantly increasing the deduction is made that there must be more than meets the eye in this matter. How much truth there may be in the statement cannot be determined from other data. In short, the general belief is that the tiny wards that every year become public burdens to the community are the result of unmoral mothers. This position gives them the best chance of getting off scot-free. It is plain that a very large proportion of the babies picked up on the streets or discovered in various places are the offspring of women who abandon them solely for the purpose of making money for nurturing other people's babies.

WHAT THE OFFICIALS SAY.

"There is no question but that women reject their young babes for the sake of money, and that they do this during the childhood of others," said the superintendents of the infant asylum on Randall's Island, where over 1,000 foundlings are received for the expense in the course of a year.

"It has been found by investigation that the majority of the abandoned babies are the result of the carelessness of the mothers, and that they are obliged to abandon their babes through poverty, infidelity, or some other cause which makes it difficult for the mother to support her infant.

But a large proportion of the inmates of the institution are dependent on the city's charity. Wet nurses were hired, but the employment agencies to the city, and the wages given to them were so high per week, gave the management much trouble by sending scouts here to the island to entice them away. Women who give up the price of private families will give up \$100 a week.
