LOCAL BRIEFS.

Woodmen to Give a Dance.—Great Salt Lake Camp, Woodmen of America will give a dance flavored with refreshments Thursday evening, in Odd Fellows hall to defray expenses of the degree ceremony to be given Jan. 18, to assist in a local initiation.

San Juan Comes Through.—The San Juan county assessors have finally sent in their annual report to the state board of equalization, much to the relief of the clerk who no longer is threatened with premature baldness on account of worry over this much delinquent shire.

Festival at Oakley.—The children of the Sunday school connected with the American Union Sabbath school in Oakley addition, were given a Christmas festival Monday evening, before a large attendance of parents and pupils. There was music, a variety of school exercises, graphophone selections and refreshments, each child receiving a basket of candy and nuts.

Children Make Merry.—Phillips Congregational church resounded with the chatter of 250 children Tuesday night, as they celebrated the annual Christmas festival. There was a large, heavily laden tree, with L. H. Page as Santa Claus. An enjoyable program with vocal and instrumental music, both solo and ensemble, preceded a little play called "Christmas Pranks." The evening was happily spent.

Thirteen Hit the Trail.—Thirteen weary Willies lined up before Police Judge Bowman Tuesday afternoon charged with having stolen where they hung up their hats. When they individually and collectively informed the court that they were really suffering from the trail, they were allowed to go. Four plain drunks were given lectures and told to make for their homes.

Death of Mrs. Steelman.—Word reached this city Tuesday night of the death at Caldwell, Idaho, of Mrs. Elizabeth Steelman, wife of Rev. H. B. Steelman, formerly pastor of the First Baptist church in this city. Mrs. Steelman has been ill for some time with consumption but no immediate consequences were expected until last week when she was seized with an hemorrhage of the lungs which proved fatal later.

Conservation Reports.—The subcommittee of the Utah Conservation commission met Tuesday afternoon and completed the report on the reports of the committees and preparing them for the printer. Professor Joseph F. Merrill, O. J. Salisbury and Le Roy Armistead were members of the subcommittee and the report will be received from the press, the members say, about February. It will cover about 100 pages of printed matter.

High Water in Lake.—The city engineer is informed that Utah lake is now 1.75 feet higher than it was a year ago at this time, although the 60-foot gates at the mouth of the lake have been closed. The engineer believes this means that west Salt Lake will be a lake in the spring, as the Jordan has as much water in it now as it will have in the spring. High water is likely to occur when the snow melt in the spring.

Another Bank for Denver.—It is reported from Denver that the Cosgriff Brothers who own a chain of banks extending from Cheyenne to Oregon, are planning to establish a national bank in the Colorado capital, to be known as the Hibernia National bank. This name is familiar enough in the larger cities of the country where it is used in connection with banking institutions, just as "Germania" is frequently used. The names of other European cities are also thus used in various forms.

Insane Man From Summit.—E. L. Benson, a rancher from Summit county, was brought to the sheriff's office Tuesday afternoon bound hand and foot, by Sheriff J. C. Coffey and Deputy Sheriff J. W. Wilds to be examined as to his sanity. Judge T. D. Lewis ordered him committed to the state mental hospital upon the recommendation of the lunacy commission. Benson is 46 years old and became violently insane Monday. It was necessary to put him in a strait jacket to prevent him from injuring himself.

School Teacher's Surprise.—A popular young business man and a pretty school teacher of Brigham came quickly to Salt Lake, Monday, and were made man and wife without even the knowledge or consent of the principals. The participants are George Chandler, son of George E. Chandler, and Miss Emma Robinson. The ceremony, the groom bravely took the ceremony, the response being hearty congratulations. Later in the day there was a family union and a feast in celebration of the happy event.

Unity Hall Crowded.—The dramatic entertainment given last evening at Unity hall by the younger members of the Unitarian society was a decided success. A large audience was present in addition to the fond parents of the boys and girls who took part. Mrs. Frank Larson was the soloist, who faithfully on the presentation of the three playlets, was the recipient of congratulations on the complete success of the whole. The three pieces presented were "The Dress Rehearsal," "The Scapgrace" and "Shades of Shakespeare's Women."

Misfortune is Lad's Companion.—Parley Williams, a 16 year old newsboy, is the hero of a chapter of accidents that rivals the pathetic narrative of Mark Twain's "Aurelia's Young Man." Parley fractured his right arm three weeks ago in a boxing match. With his arm still in the plaster cast, he stumbled and fell Tuesday evening, and fractured his left arm. He was removed to a police station where Surgeon Steele set the broken member, and the boy said he broke a leg a few years ago followed later by a broken collar bone in a foot ball game. The boy has no home, and has of late lived at the detention home.

Funeral of Franz Jungk.—The funeral of Franz Jungk was held this afternoon from Evans chapel in State street with interment in Mt. Olivet cemetery. The deceased was born at Cassel, Germany, 1854, coming to this country when 18 years old. In 1872, Mr. Jungk located in Salt Lake where, he formed a business partnership with F. J. Fabian. Two years ago Mr. Jungk was taken ill, necessitating removal to a sanitarium at Portland, where he died last week. He was a nephew of F. W. Billings, and was unmarried. He leaves a brother, who continues his interest in the firm.

Miss Gleason in Hospital.—Miss Nora Gleason, organist and director of the St. Mary's Catholic cathedral choir has been taken to the Holy Cross hospital for nerve treatment. Miss Gleason has been in ill health for several weeks.

LABOR UNIONS TAKE ACTION

Resolutions Passed Condemning Real Estate Association's Advertising Salt Lake Recently.

PLENTY OF MEN FOR WORK.

Denial That There Is Any Shortage of Labor Either Skilled or Unskilled At the Present Time.

The objections of organized labor to the recent action of the Salt Lake Real Estate association in advertising in eastern and British papers that a shortage of labor exists in this city, took definite shape at the meeting of the Cement Finishers' and Helpers union last night. Resolutions were passed condemning the Real Estate association's course as untrue and unfair. It is denied that any shortage of labor exists, either skilled or unskilled, and it is stated that such advertisements tend to bring many undesirable persons to Salt Lake and to exercise a detrimental effect.

Following are the resolutions: "Whereas, The Real Estate association of Salt Lake City has extensively advertised that a shortage of skilled labor exists in this city; and Whereas, It is a well-known fact to members of organized labor that such a shortage does not exist; and Whereas, The Real Estate association has advertised in its claim that a labor shortage exists in this city in spite of every evidence to the contrary, ignoring the protests of the registered laborers and members of organized labor, who declare they have many members idle, and competent to do first-class work in their respective trades;

"Whereas, It is common knowledge that there has been a shortage of material, which has been shipped here, and that a material and not a labor shortage has existed; and Whereas, It would seem reasonable to believe that should a labor shortage exist at the present time we should be apprised of such shortage in the want columns of Salt Lake City papers, as well as eastern and foreign publications;

"Whereas, It is unfair to misrepresent labor conditions in this city, being likely to cause an influx of both skilled and unskilled labor to the detriment of the welfare of the workmen already here; and Whereas, An influx of labor would result in bringing more crooks here, who would be responsible for more cases of robbery and other crimes, some at least charged to innocent workmen;

"Whereas, A labor influx in almost midwinter would bring about a heavy burden on the charitable and religious institutions of this city, who would be compelled to bear the burden, and not the Real Estate association, which would be responsible for their coming here; and Whereas, It is plainly evident to all fair-minded citizens familiar with the local labor situation that more skilled or unskilled laborers are not needed at this time;

"Therefore, be it resolved, by the Cement Finishers and Helpers' union local 122, of Salt Lake City, That we condemn the action of the Real Estate association as untrue and unfair, and pledge ourselves to give every assistance in our power to counteract the influence of the advertisement; and be it further resolved: That in order that the truth may be presented to the public here and elsewhere concerning the labor situation of Salt Lake City a copy of these resolutions be submitted to the press."

CARPENTERS ALSO. The carpenters of Salt Lake City have also taken a determined stand against the action of the Real Estate association, and are going to raise a question of the action of the union over the United States, against carpenters coming to Salt Lake in search of employment. At a meeting of representatives of the three carpenter unions of the city it was decided to send out the following notice:

(Warning to carpenters: Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 24, 1909. Overstocked with men. The number of unemployed is increasing every day. Men are coming in from all parts, lured here by misleading newspaper talk and unscrupulous real estate boomers. All carpenters are advised to stay away from Salt Lake City unless they want to walk the streets in search of work. The already large number of unemployed. The circular is signed by B. J. Wilson, president local No. 184; C. Debrunner, president local No. 276; and W. Fickering, president Amalgamated No. 720.

Although the principal business transacted at the meeting of the cement workers last night was the discussion of the action of the Real Estate association, officers were also elected to serve for the ensuing six months as follows: President, W. C. Ernest; vice president, F. C. Anderson; secretary, N. T. Thurston; treasurer, E. Ekker.

ANOTHER LEAK DEVELOPS. Intercepting Sewer Breaks Out Again In a New Place.

City Engineer George O. Chaney filed a communication with the city recorder Tuesday on his way to the council informing them that another leak has been found in the intercepting sewer. This time it was discovered under the flood of the pumping plant at Seventh North and Eighth West and will cost \$500 to repair it.

In another letter, the city council is informed that it will cost \$20,000 for the construction of a conduit 3,500 feet long to handle the waters of Mill Creek at Twelfth South street. The conduit would do away with the floods in the spring time. Owners would be able to get their water from the East Jordan & Salt Lake canal if this method was employed, and the work which has been suggested would not be necessary.

SIMS PRODUCES WILL. Document Left by Late G. G. Perry Is Filed for Probate.

George H. Sims, manager of the Salt Lake Livestock & Transfer company, produced the will of George G. Perry Tuesday afternoon and filed it in the probate division of the Third district court pursuant to the order of Judge T. D. Lewis. For more than a year Sims has had the will in his possession and refused to give it up.

The testator died on Sept. 25, 1907, in Salt Lake City. In his will he bequeathed his real property at 268 East Fifth South street, to his widow during her life, and the residue of his estate in fee of rent, and reserving \$10 a month for her own support. Upon her death the property is to be sold and divided equally between the five children. The will names Mrs. Amy M. Gray as executrix.
