Hazing Incident Closed—Thief Caught

Ogden, Utah, Feb. 11.—At the meeting of the board of education last night...

Principal George Thomas of the high school and Supt. William Allison stated that all of the boys who participated in the hazing excepting two had written the apologies required by the board and had been reinstated. One of the two exceptions is a boy who has been sick.
