HUGHES' FIGHT ON RACE TRACKS struggle to Suppress Gambling

To Be Bitter and

Relentless.

ALL NEW YORK STIRRED UP vo Quarter Given or Taken-The Value and Profits of Big Racing Plants Shown.

A New York dispatch says that Gover-Hughes has mapped out for himself fight he has had so far in hardest spublic career in attempting to abolish track gambling in the state of New s. It will be a bitter, relentless fight, with no quarter given or asked on either side, with no trick of the legislative game emitted, and with cretain sections of the forgotten on one side at least nenal cod when it comes to obtaining legislative

support. In his message the governor's recom-mendation reads much like a command, and this goes out to men who have been dilated with racing or race tracks for pars. It did not take long for the lines he arrayed, and the war talk rose on with sides before the ink was dry on the earras that told of the state executive's stong presentment. #### HOT TIME FOR TIMBER WOLVES IS DUE TOMORROW

American sportsmen are invited to participate in a timber wolf hunt, which will be held at Kippawa, Province of

Quebec, tomorrow. An old wolf hunter and many guides will lead the party against these cunning animals, which are said to be destroying better game as they increase in numbers.

The hunt will be under the auspices

as they increase in numbers. The hunt will be under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific railway, which will furnish the outfit and provide am-munition. The promoters guarantee no treezing and no hardships to those who will dress as they are told. According to the prospectus, the par-ty will take the train to the nearest station to the hunting grounds selected. Then, after an hour's practise on snow-shoes (which is said to be enough to teach anybody their use), the hunters will drive by settlers' or lumber roads as near as possible to the camp, which will be made ready in advance. At the end of the drive the snowshoes will be ted on, the toboggans loaded, and the start made for the camp of tents. The prospectus adds: "Special attention will be paid to the shooting, so that no chance shots will reach men instead of wolves. In addi-tion to the drive, various schemes for trapping will be tried. Washington, Jan. 15 .- Senator Warren, chairman of the military affairs, today introduced a bill for the pay of army officers as follows:

Lieutenant general, 10 per cent.

Licutenant general, 10 per cent. Major generals and brigadier gener-als, 15 per cent. Colonels, lieutenant colonels and majors, 20 per cent. Captains and first and second lieu-tenants and cadets, 25 per cent. The provision of law allowing the president to fix the pay of the et-listed men of the navy is applie? to the enlisted men of the army, but it is pr vided that such increases shall nct result in an enhancement of more than result in an enhancement of more than 40 per cent of the present pay.
