RICHMOND, Va., 24.—In the colored-educational convention, to-day, a constitution was adopted for the state educational society, to aid in the instruction of meritorious youths in the higher branches of study. J. W. Cromwell, one of the speakers, asserted that it was the duty of the State government to enforce the collection of the capitation tax, by making the right of suffrage depend on its payment. Desmire was subsequently elected President of the society, and resolutions were adopted requesting the State Board of Education to establish a colored normal school.

PHILADELPHIA, 24.—The international champion swimming match between Coy's of Chester and Johnson of England, took place this p.m. from the Lazzaretto to Gloucester, ten miles. Coyle was taken from the water after swimming about six miles, but was held and unable to go much further. Johnson, who took the lead from the start, reached the end of the course looking fresh.

Official Instructions. The Secretary of the Treasury, to-day, addressed a letter of instructions to the commissioner just appointed by him to examine the Chicago custom house building in which he recognizes the need of an early completion of this important public work, not only to the government, but to the prosperity and business interests of Chicago, and at the same time to recognize the responsibility resting upon the department and the paramount duty of preventing the sacrifice of the money of public money upon works which may not possibly be safely completed—the appropriation for the building was two million dollars—and for these reasons he has determined to confide to the commissioner the view of former reports, as the basis of the action of the department. Mr. A. J. Wood, the commissioner, and that their investigations may be full and accurate, their attention is invited to the following points, viz: 1st.—To the nature and condition of the building, and whether this being of the first and paramount importance, and that by all such tests and appliances in mechanics and engineering, and that the building is of proper level, on firm ground, and of adequate strength in all respects to sustain the proposed building, and whether it is desirable for such a structure. 2d.—To the nature and quality of the stone out of which the edifice is to be constructed, whether of granite, or other material, and whether it is desirable for such a structure. 3d.—The indications shown of the sufficiency or otherwise of the stone and other materials in so much of the structure as has been accomplished. 4th.—Whether any change in the plans or materials to be used in the construction of the building should be made, and if so, what, and an estimate of the probable cost of such change, adding such suggestions as will give a practical effect to the conclusions they may reach in connection with the whole matter thus submitted to the commissioner, and his confidence in their intelligence, impartiality and qualification to discharge their duties. The Secretary hopes they will, as a commissioner, effect an organization, and proceed at once to Chicago, and patiently and thoroughly investigate the matters committed to them, and inform the department, such means as they may deem proper to adopt as well as by their own personal examination.
