SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 7.—The Chair presented Carl Schurz's communication praying that a constitutional amendment be presented which shall give the counting of the votes of the electoral college to the Supreme Court; laid on the table.

Anthony, from the printing committee, favored the printing of the depositions accompanying Senator Sherman's report, on the election in Louisiana.

Saulsbury dissented from the majority report declaring that *ex parte* testimony should not be disseminated.

McDonald favored the printing of all the testimony on both sides concerning the South Carolina, Louisiana, and Florida elections.

Sherman could not agree to the proceedings of the board. Second Vice President's sworn statements. Third—The testimony taken legally on interrogatories and cross interrogatories.

Eaton opposed the printing of testimony other than that taken by the regular congressional committees in the regular way.

Morton said the democratic dilemma could be solved by the ingenuity of the other side.

When the republicans invited the democrats to lay the whole case before the country, the latter refused, and when the republicans offered to publish the matter, the democrats asked them not to do so.

Sherman defended his committee, which presented the testimony as evidence. On this testimony the returning board made its decision.

Thurman reaffirmed that this was not the report of an official board, and this was not an authorized report. Where was the statute authorizing it?

Edmunds said the second article of the federal constitution ordered the President to transmit from time to time information as to the state of the Union. It was his bounden duty, and he obeyed it by inviting citizens to go to New Orleans to get the facts of the case and report. He then presented the result to Congress. It was unprecedented to refuse to print the information sent in by the President.

Whereas, The action of the said governor in issuing a certificate of election to said Cronin was

wholly unauthorized, illegal and fraudulent, and a gross violation

of the rights of the people of Oregon, and the action of said Cronin

in assuming to act as elector, and to appoint two others, as wholly

fraudulent and wicked; therefore,

Resolved, &c., That the committee on privileges and elections is

instructed to investigate the alleged election of Cronin, and to

ascertain the facts in relation to the alleged election of Cronin, and

to report thereon to the committee.

Ordered printed and lie on the table.

Howe introduced this bill to re-

store unauthorized persons from assuming to act as presidential electors.

Be it enacted, &c., That every

person who shall in any State act as elector for President and Vice

President of the United States, or make or certify to any list of persons

voted for President or Vice President, or shall direct or transmit

any such certified list to the President of the Senate, either by mail

or messenger, or who shall deposit any such certified list with the

Judge of any District Court within the United States, or who shall in any other way assume to act as

elector for President and Vice President without having been duly

appointed to act, and in accordance with the law of such State, shall be deemed guilty of felony, and

on conviction thereof, be fined not less than \$10,000, and be imprisoned

not less than ten years.

Sec. 2.—Every person who shall bear any such certified list of persons voted for President and Vice

President of the United States to the seat of government, or shall

transmit the same to the President of the Senate, knowing such list to

be certified to by persons not duly appointed to act, shall be adjudged

guilty of felony, and shall, on conviction thereof, be fined not less

than \$10,000, and shall be imprisoned not less than five years. Re-

SAN FRANCISCO, 7.—The latest

advice from Salem, Oregon, say that all republican and democratic

electors assembled in the room off the Senate chamber. The Secretary

of State passed an envelope through the door to Cronin, who read it as

a certificate of the vote given to Odell, Cartwright and himself. He

then put it in his pocket, refusing to show it to the republicans. Odell

Cartwright and Cronin sealed themselves at the table and organized

by electing Odell chairman. They then proceeded to seal the room,

but the other democrats, Klippell and Laswell, refused to leave, he

remained at the request of the other republicans. Watts then tendered

his resignation as an elector. Odell

and Cartwright severely demanded their certificates of

Cronin, who repeatedly refused to surrender them. After some time

Cartwright asked if they refused to act with him. Odell and Cartwright

said no, very emphatically, but demanded that their authority to act

should be shown. Cronin then left the table, the republican electors

operating with him, and after calling in Miller and Parker, organized his

electoral college as before reported.
