

REPORTS ON STATEHOOD BILL.

Chairman Hamilton Submits One
Favoring Two States Out
Of Four Territories.

DEMOCRATS FOR 3 STATES.

They Charge Majority With Seeking
To Unjustly Keep Oklahoma
Out of the Union.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The Republican members of the committee on territories submitted to the house this afternoon the majority report on the statehood bill, which provides for the admission of Oklahoma and Indian Territory as the state of Oklahoma, and provides joint statehood for New Mexico and Arizona under the name of Arizona.

The Democratic members of the house committee on territories presented a minority report in opposition to the Hamilton joint statehood bill. After reviewing the resources of the four territories of Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and declaring in favor of joint statehood for Oklahoma and Indian Territory, the report says there is no more reason for joining New Mexico and Arizona than there would be for joining Alaska and Porto Rico.

The manifest purpose of the majority is to unjustly keep Oklahoma out of the Union unless they can, with greater justice, force Arizona in, says the report.

"We regret the president's action in recommending, without assigning any reason, joint statehood for Arizona and New Mexico, and thus ignoring the last expression of the Republican national platform on the question of statehood for the remaining territories."

The report concludes:

"Should the Republican party pass this bill, wicked as it is, in the denial of equal rights in representation, and partisan in all of its material details, it will but afford another indecent example of the suppression of individual territorial and national rights to subordinate party ends."

Representative Hamilton (Mich.), chairman of the house committee on territories, today submitted a favorable report on the Hamilton joint statehood bill, which provides for the admission of Oklahoma and Indian Territory as the state of Oklahoma, and provides joint statehood for New Mexico and Arizona under the name of Arizona.

The report reviews the bill in detail, explaining that the capital of Arizona is to be at Santa Fe until 1915, and that the capital of Oklahoma is to be at Guthrie, for the same length of time, when the people can choose their capital sites with justice to all parts of the states. The report says:

"This committee considers the criticism as ill formed which finds fault with New Mexico because of its foreign population."

"Out of a population of 195,316, New Mexico has only 16,465 foreign born inhabitants, a smaller percentage of foreign born than most states of the Union."

"New Mexico was made a territory in 1850, and ever since that time the people of that territory have elected their own legislators, made their own laws, conducted their own local government and contributing revenues to the federal treasury."

"Were it not that the two-fifths of its population which are native born but of Spanish descent have been heretofore erroneously referred to as foreign, it would be an asperser upon a patriotic people even to refer to their loyalty. The remaining three-fifths of its population are of the same character as the people of Arizona."

"Of the alleged undervaluation of property in Arizona for purposes of taxation, which was warmly discussed in hearings, the report says: 'It has a total assessed valuation of taxable property as shown by the report of the secretary of the interior of \$57,920,372, but it is probable that its property is returned for taxation at a comparatively small percentage of its market value in some instances, as indicated by government reports, at not over 5 per cent of its actual value.'"

"Concerning taxes in New Mexico, the report says: 'The assessed valuation of property

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within the territory for the year 1905 was \$42,573,792, but it is asserted that for purposes of taxation property is not returned at much more than 20 per cent of its market value."

The report concludes as follows: "Inasmuch as Congress by the organic act of the Territory of Oklahoma that all of the original Indian Territory, together with what is now Beaver county, should become one state and inasmuch as the present territory of Oklahoma has for some time been qualified for statehood, which has been deferred until the Indian Territory should be ready to join therewith in statehood, and

"Inasmuch as conditions in the Indian Territory imperatively demand some better form of government than now exists there; and

"Inasmuch as Indian lands will be allotted in severalty before the time when statehood can go into effect, this committee reports in favor of the joining of the Territory of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory in one state, not, however, before March 4, 1907, such state to be known as the state of Oklahoma."

"To that end and to that effect, the territories of Arizona and New Mexico may be joined in one state to be known as the state of Arizona; this committee recommends that the bill do pass."

INSURGENTS IN CAUCUS.

Outline Their Proposed Fight Against
The Hamilton Bill.

Washington, Jan. 23.—Thirty-four Republican statehood "insurgents" held a caucus today in Representative Haggood's committee room and outlined their fight against the Hamilton bill. This is the largest number of Republican members that has been at an anti-statehood meeting and Mr. Haggood, Mr. Mondell and other leaders of the fight against the Hamilton bill say it shows their strength is increasing as the struggle approaches.

"Insurgent" leaders now claim 60 Republican votes against the proposed bill to prevent amending the Hamilton bill, and say there is no truth in the rumor that Democrats are leaving the city and have been induced to remain away so they cannot vote with the Democratic organization, which is in harmony with the Republican "insurgents," and wants to prevent the admission of New Mexico and Arizona as one state.

Democrats who are out of the city are being summoned by Representative Williams, leader of the minority, to return in time to oppose the anti-amendment rule. Although the Democrats have no statehood caucus, their position has been plainly outlined by Mr. Williams, and the Democratic members on the territories committee made a minority report on the Hamilton bill that no Democratic member is expected to desert his party stand on the issue, providing he is in the house when a vote is taken.

Mr. Lloyd, the Democratic whip, said tonight that he expects to be able to have at least 125 Democrats in the house tomorrow to vote against the bill preventing amendments to the Hamilton bill. Mr. Dwyer of Nevada is at home on account of illness in his family and Messrs. Hearst and Cockran, both of New York; McDermott of New Jersey and Hill and Hyatt, both of Mississippi, are Democrats who will not be here. Nearly 25 Republicans are out of the city, and both the forces are working hard to gather in absentees.

Although the insurgents say they feel sure they will have plenty of votes, more conservative members of the anti-joint statehood force admit that six of these votes may fail them, but that under no condition can they fail to have less than 50 votes against the rule. This number is sufficient to defeat the Republican amendment, if it is not succeeded in rallying most of its absentees.

Edwin J. Yorkman, a reporter, was the next witness. He said Justice Deuel told him that he was the center of town topics. The witness said that the justice also said that when Col. Mann was away he (Deuel) was the editor in chief, and that at all times he was consulted by Col. Mann.

"Judge Deuel" continued the witness, "gave me to understand that he passed upon the legal aspect of things appearing in Town Topics. He gave me to understand that his connection with the Smart Set was even closer, than that to Town Topics."

The next witness was Robert Irving, editor of the New York World, who is under arrest on a charge of libel brought against him in connection with a story in his own paper. He was questioned by Mr. Shepard, of counsel for the defense. Mr. Irving said that he had been a solicitor for Fads and Fancies. He received 15 per cent on all orders secured by him. He gave a list of persons who refused to subscribe, among them Andrew Carnegie, Senator Russell A. Alger, William Rockefeller, Mrs. Potter Palmer and Cornelius Vanderbilt.

He visited Mr. Alger at Detroit, and called on Grover Cleveland at Princeton. At the time he saw Mr. Vanderbilt he thought there was some one near by concealed behind a curtain, although he did not see any one.

Irving, in response to questions by Dist. Atty. Jerome, said that he had been told he would not be prosecuted on the charge pending against him if he told the truth in this case.

"Did you ever threaten to 'roast' people?" asked Mr. Jerome. "No occasion to," replied Mr. Irving. "It was all flattery," he said.

Moos Ellis Wooster, who solicited for Fads and Fancies, was the next witness. He said he gave up the work because he "found the interviews disagreeable."

The witness said the printer of Fads and Fancies was to charge \$35,000 for turning out 200 copies. He said that Harry Lehr subscribed to Fads and Fancies, and paid \$200 on his subscription. This money was later returned with the contract.

"Lehr told me," said Wooster, "that he had been badly treated in Town Topics."

Lehr, the witness said, called on Col. Mann, who afterward told the witness that Lehr should not have been treated so badly, and that he was to see Lehr and get him to pay the subscription to Fads and Fancies. Lehr, however, refused. Witness said to Lehr that he (Wooster) was interested in Lehr's subscription to the extent of \$200, and Lehr gave him a check for that amount.

The witness said that pleasant stories were then printed about Lehr for a time, but later the unpleasant ones reappeared.

Wooster continued his testimony after recess, stating that Col. Mann

Col. W. D. Mann Tells How the
Multi-Millionaire Became
A Stockholder.

ACQUAINTANCE WITH MORGAN

Concerning Pleasant and Unpleasant
Paragraphs and Influence of Money
On the Writing of Them.

New York, Jan. 23.—The trial of Norman Haggood, editor of Collier's Weekly, charged with criminal libel by Justice Mc Duell, a city magistrate, as a result of the publication of a photograph concerning the latter's connection with Town Topics, is nearing an end. After the examination of Col. W. D. Mann, editor of Town Topics, the defense introduced a number of witnesses and upon adjournment this evening counsel for Mr. Haggood announced that they would probably finish their case tomorrow.

The trial was followed today with the same interest that had been manifested since the hearing was begun. Fashionably attired women were again conspicuous among those in the courtroom.

Col. Mann, recalled, was the first witness on the stand today. A copy of Town Topics, issued in 1899, was shown the witness, who denied that Abraham H. Hummel, the lawyer, and consulted with him to write an unpleasant paragraph in that issue of the paper.

Col. Mann then told of the beginning of his connection with Town Topics, and how W. K. Vanderbilt came to be a stockholder of the paper. Col. Mann said: "In 1878 I was connected with the Pullman Car company. When the crisis came in Wall street, or I might say the conspiracy," said the witness, "I found myself suddenly changed from being a millionaire to owning not a dollar and being \$100,000 in debt. It was at this time I became interested in Town Topics, and I went to W. K. Vanderbilt and asked him for a loan."

"I think he gave me about \$5,000. I told Mr. Vanderbilt that I wished to get out of debt and wanted him to help me. He told me that what I owed him I need not worry about. I sent to Mr. Vanderbilt and told him I needed more money, and asked him to loan me some Town Topics stock as collateral security. Later he returned my notes and the stock and said he did not care to loan me any more money, but he said he would loan me \$10,000."

Asked how he came to be sufficiently well acquainted with J. P. Morgan to borrow \$25,000 from him without security, Col. Mann said:

"I met and knew his father. I think I know him well enough to ask him. 'Will you tell the jury,' said Dist. Atty. Jerome, 'what reason there was for Thomas F. Ryan to lend you \$10,000?'"

"Well, that was three or four years ago. As I remember, Mr. Whitney introduced me to Mr. Ryan. He said I think I liked him. He said: 'Mr. Mann is a gentleman and an honest man, and any time you can do anything for him or lend him any money I want you to do it.'"

"I did not see Mr. Ryan again for some time. When I asked him to lend me the money and offered shares as collateral, Mr. Ryan said he would take the matter under consideration. He said: 'I called on Mr. Ryan and he said: 'I do not want the shares, but I will lend you the \$10,000. Give me your note and I will give you the money.'"

Clarence Jones, the witness said, loaned him \$10,000.

Col. Mann was then questioned by Atty. James W. Osborne, of counsel for Mr. Haggood's defense.

"Do you remember that scandalous paragraphs were written about E. C. Jones?" the lawyer asked.

"I do not," Col. Mann replied.

"After you got the \$10,000 did you write pleasant paragraphs?" "Possibly then and possibly before; why should I not?"
