highest price ever obtained for public lands in the state. The principal acre-age disposed of was in the region of American Falls. About 14 miles above that place a city will doubtless be es-tablished in the near future, upon a section of school land that was included in the late sale. The American Falls Canal and Power company has an immense canal, run-ning from a point in the Snake river just above Blackfoot to a point within it miles of American Falls, a distance of 55 miles. The canal is one of the largest, probably the largest for irriga-tion purposes, in the United States. For a distance of 40 miles from the intake it is 70 feet wide at the bottom and 90 feet at the top, carrying a volume of water equal to a good sized river. Not less than 80,000 acres of land will be watered by the canal, and an immense amount of electrical power will be generated. WHY NOT A TILE PLANT.

#### Splendid Clay Beds in Vicinity of Salt Lake Await Development.

There is an effort being made by local industrial promoters to interest eastern capital in the development of the clay beds not far from this city as furnishbeds not far from this city as furnish-ing the raw material for a first-elass factory for the manufacture of roofing tiles and ferra cotta. There is no tile of over 1,000 miles from this city, and all other roofing materials are also shipped in here from long distances.
