The Lord is moving upon the hearts of His people towards a renewed activity in the prosecution of their temple labors is shown in both general and individual cases. And one of the recent beautiful instances of His earnestness to individuals is evidenced in the following dream:

But just as he started, a woman, dressed in beautiful robes, approached him, and said, "Brother Scott, your wife wants you right away in the temple to do some urgent work." He knew she meant his dead wife, but he said at once he could not possibly go, for he had so many pressing duties to keep him at home while he was making his excuse, his mother stepped up, and looking him earnestly in the eyes, said, "Walter, you MUST go to the temple, for this is the eleventh hour." And the thrill of heavenly impulse which seized him caused him to turn at once as if to comply with her request. As he did so, his wife stood beside him and said, "Meet me at 11 o'clock in the temple." At considerable expense and trouble, Elder Scott at once prepared his affairs to come to the temple. And a gratifying experience was to find that the ten or a dozen names which he expected to find in his mother's sheets, developed, by the time he was ready to go, into over 50 names, and still a few more sheets left to glean from.

Another evidence of the widespread interest in genealogy in the world, and of the reason for its existence, is related by President McQuarrie of the Eastern States mission.

His recent relative, Mrs. Artemisia Segmiller, the eldest daughter of the late Apostle Erasmus Snow, was visiting with his family in New York City this winter and while there was taken by Pres. McQuarrie to the Lenox library in that city, to see what she could find in the matter of genealogy. She was surprised to discover that she not only was in possession of some of the most important information in the world, but that there was a lady in Rochester, New York, at work collecting information on her mother's side. She wrote to this lady, and from her received an invitation to pay a visit on Mrs. Segmiller's way back to Utah. The invitation was gladly accepted, and Mrs. Segmiller found that the lady had already collected hundreds of names, and was pursuing her work with all the zeal and ardor noticeable in similar cases. More than that, Mrs. Segmiller was helped by her new friend on a number of little trips, to visit the Hill Cumorah.
