THE FOURTH IN THE SETTLEMENTS.

The celebration consisted of firing salutes, martial music, hoisting of the national flag, display of banners, mottoes, &c., &c.

At 8 a.m. there were foot and sack races, and athletic exercises till half past nine. At 10 a.m., the citizens met at the bowery, and were entertained with music, reading of the Declaration of Independence, oration, speeches, reading original papers, national songs, operatic choruses by the choir, music by the quadrille and martial bands, loyal and amusing toasts and sentiments.

At 2 p.m. dancing at the bowery, interspersed with original recitations, popular songs, &c., till 6 p.m., when the services were brought to a close, all being satisfied with the good feeling and harmony that prevailed throughout the day.

The Fourth of July in this place went off finely.

At sunrise the Stars and Stripes were hoisted and saluted by a volley from infantry under command of Lieut. William F. Neslin. At 10 o'clock a.m., the people assembled in the meeting-house for enjoyment. Prayer by the chaplain, Patriarch William Cazier. A. Lowe, Esq., was orator for the day, and among the many good things which he enumerated, as springing from the Declaration of Independence, not the least was that under the broad folds of the Constitution of the United States the Kingdom of God had been organized, and ultimately it would guarantee true liberty to all mankind. Songs, comic and sentimental, with recitations, were the order of the morning, interspersed with sweet music from Capt. John S. Hawkins' brass, and Capt. Charles Sperry's orchestral bands,—they playing some soul-stirring national and favorite popular airs. The assembly was dismissed at noon by benediction from the chaplain.

From 2 o'clock p.m. till 5, the juvenile portion of the community enjoyed themselves in the dance; music gratuitous.

At 7 o'clock Capt. Samuel Cazier's Company of Cavalry assembled in the Social Hall for a dance, the public being pleased (through their committee) to manifest their appreciation of the Company's services, by confining the dance entirely to it. Everything went merrily till midnight.

Nothing occurred to mar the peace and good order of the day.

AMERICAN FORK, July 5, 1867.

EDITOR DESERET NEWS:

The Fourth was a big day here. The military of the north part of Utah Co., under the command of our efficient Col. Chipman and assistants, made a very fine display, and occupied the main part of the day in a variety of movements including the skirmish and

shamfight drills, which rendered it a very useful and interesting day. In addition to the military a very large encampment of citizens—men, women, young folks and children—occupied a very nice location on an extensive grass-plot near Green's Corner; and from the display of people, horses, carriages, wagons, tents, banners, &c., no one would be likely to judge that this part of Utah County is on the decline or in any manner affected with sterility.

In addition to the military display, as the services in that department were drawing to a close, the citizens began to assemble in the City Hall, where the celebration of the day was continued with all the incidents and honors. The choir and brass band were in attendance and gave us much cheerful music. An oration was delivered by Arza Adams, Esq., and a short speech by L. E. Harrington, on the principles of the Declaration of Independence. Others made short addresses, with quite an installment of toasts, songs, recitations, &c.

A party was held in the hall in the evening, which was well attended, as a matter of course.

Thus with improvement, military and social reunion, fraternal good will, and joy, passed off the ever memorable Fourth of July at American Fork.

Our enterprising citizens have concluded to bridge the Sevier river at this place, and for this purpose have formed a company with br. Charles Robinson at the head, assisted by brs. Paul and Littlewood. Active operations have already commenced; part of the timber is on the ground, and a party of men just returned from the mountains report that the timber is all cut, ready for hauling. The company anticipate having the bridge completed by the twenty-fourth of July.

It will be situated about sixty miles below the old bridge; and the route will be on a straight line due north and south, through Rush and Tooele Valleys; good road all the way, convenient watering places and plenty of grass.

On the 9th inst. we were favored with a visit from Bishop Callister and br. M. F. Lyman, when much valuable instruction was imparted. Among other good things we were counseled to take care of our sheep and improve them. The Bishop also established a Sunday school.

Our crops look very promising; there was a beautiful rain yesterday, that did our irrigating for us. We have completed a commodious Bowery. Our worthy President, br. Robinson, is a go-ahead man.

London, July 1.

In the redistribution of parliamentary seats, the Government concedes one additional member each to Liverpool, Birmingham, Manchester and Leeds.

Chicago, 2.

Chauncey Page, who murdered his wife and her mother in Valparaiso, Ind., last winter, was found guilty to-day and sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Portsmouth, N. H., 1.

Rear Admiral G. F. Pearson died this morning, aged 68.

New York, 1.

Deplorable accounts are given of the destitution in Wake County, North Carolina; 300 families have not four days supplies; some have had no meat for weeks, no bread for months, and no sugar or coffee for years.

Paris, 1.

At the distribution of prizes at the international Exposition to-day, the multitude filled all the aisles and circles of the great building and overflowed into the gardens of the Camp de Mars. The Emperor and Empress, the Prince Imperial, and Prince Napoleon, with their suit-s, proceeded to the Exposition in eight carriages each drawn by six horses, and accompanied by Abdul

Aziz, Sultan of Turkey, and suite, in six splendid carriages drawn by six horses richly caparisoned. When the military ceremonies were concluded, the Emperor rose and said: Peoples and kingdoms have come here to crown the idea of peace and conciliation. France is proud to be great, prosperous and free, yet she is not unnerved by her material joys; the thoughtful can see the national fibres vibrate for the honor of France, but this noble susceptibility should not create fear for the world's repose, as we here prove our anxiety for peace.

The Emperor closed his speech by saying: This exposition marks a great era in the harmony, progress and triumph of the grand moral principles which, with justice, can alone establish thrones and ennobel humanity. Great enthusiasm followed the speech, and cries of viva Napoleon, viva La Emperor, continued some minutes. When the excitement subsided, the imperial commission proceeded to announce the distribution prizes; at the conclusion of this ceremony the Emperor and Sultan, accompanied by their suites, returned to the Tuilleries.

The orchestra numbered 1,200 musicians, accompanied by an organ and musical bells. After the Emperor's speech the exhibitors received their medals from the hand of the Emperor; altogether there will be 18,500 recompenses to 6,000 exhibitors. The Emperor of Russia was awarded gold medals and five horses; Napoleon was awarded a gold medal for a model lodging house. The only one the Emperor shook hands with was Hughes, the inventor of the printing telegraph and operators.

Ottawa, C. W., 2.

After being sworn yesterday as Vice Roy of the dominion of Canada, Lord Monck announced that the Queen had conferred on the Hon. John McDonald and Messrs. Howland, McDougall, Tullp and Suppy the order of Companions of Bath; the inauguration took place in the council chamber; about fifty persons were present. Sir John A. McDonald formed the privy council, which have been sworn in.

Washington, 3.

The Senate was called to order at noon, and 32 senators answered to their names, and adjourned to the 5th. One hundred and twenty-five members answered in the House, 89 being required for a quorum.

Athens, 2.

The Greek blockade runner Acadia has made her 14th voyage to Candia, and landed 500 volunteers for the insurgents and 2,000 muskets and a supply of food and other necessities.

Havana, 28.

The yellow fever is raging in high quarters. Many people are to be tried on a charge of landing slaves. Serious disturbances are reported in Porto Rico; artillery was used to quell the insurrection, and a large number were shot.

Washington, 3.

In the House, Brooks declared that a civil revolution was impending in the north, which would be hastened if the House threw out the Kentucky delegation. The most important event of the day was the adoption of a resolution confining the business of the session exclusively to reconstruction; the rules were suspended by more than a two-thirds vote, and the resolution was adopted by 90 to 26. A resolution for a committee of 9, with Thaddeus Stevens for chairman, to prepare a supplement to the reconstruction bill, was adopted. In the meantime a senatorial caucus had decided to do the same, so that it is finally and wholly devoted to the reconstruction question. The House adjourned to the 5th.

Washington, 2.

The State Department learns from the Consul at Palermo that the cholera had broken out on the south side of Sicily; there were from 30 to 40 deaths a day in a population of 2,000. Several other places where cholera is prevalent were mentioned.

London, 4.

The English government authorities have postponed the grand review which was to take place in Hyde Park, on account of the execution of Maximilian. The conduct of the Mexican government in condemning Maximilian to death and his subsequent execution cause great indignation here and on the Continent.
