Unlike the ments through Moses. Unlike the other nations, that worshipped visible creations, Israel was required to worship thes Creator, who was invisible. This was so that faith might be exercised, that being the ob-The stift of the existence, and man's spirit-ual nature cultivated and developed. The stift of the Holy Gheet, which illumined and explanned, not only the present, but also the eternal past and uture, was the exclusive possession of hose who sought for it in God's own ppointed way. To all such it would appointed way. Yo all such it would be given, for He had promised it; and it would lead and guide them into all it would lead and ruide them into all truth. The philosophies of men were good, but they were not the Gospel of Jesus Christ. All religious systems have a measure of truth in them or they could not stand, but the fulness of truth alone would exait main to the highest degrees of glory.
