At one school house, while holding a series of meet ings, a Josephite elder asked the priv ilege of asking a few questions, which was granted him. We answered him and he then arose and began vihitying the "followers of Brigham Young." He told the people that the "Mormons" in Utah were still practicing polygamy We continued our meetings and the fol-lowing Sunday night he came back bringing with him seven or eight hood-lums, with the intention of breaking up our meeting. During our meeting they disturbed us a little by throwing rocks on the building. At the close of our meeting he came in and called the people to order and began as he had done the previous night, but was promptly seized by half a dozen young men, the constable being one of them, and was thrown out of doors and warned not to come back again, and judging from th way he left, we do not believe he will We left many good friends in the trict and are confident that his visi resulted in doing good for us. As a rule we receive excellent treatment from the people. The "News" is a welcome visitor and its pages are eagerly scanned by us, and then distributed.
