The Union Pacific, on Oct. 24, issued the following circular: "At a meeting of the board of directors of this company held in Boston on the 24th inst., Mr. William H. Holcomb was elected a member of the board, and subsequently vice-president of the company. The office of Vice-President Holcomb will be at Omaha, and he will be recognized and obeyed as chief executive officer of the Union Pacific system at the west. The general manager of the Union Pacific Railway Company will report directly to him, and receive orders from him. All returns, reports and other papers relating to the business of the company, which heretofore, since the death of Vice-President Potter, have been forwarded to this office, will in future be forwarded to the vice president at Omaha. Acting General Manager Thomas L. Kimball is hereby appointed general manager of the Union Pacific Railway Co., such appointment to take effect from Nov. 1st. Purchasing Agent C. S. Meilen is hereby appointed assistant general manager, such appointment to take effect from Nov. 1st. The duties of purchasing agent and assistant general manager are hereby consolidated. Mr. Meilen will perform the duties of both offices, under the title of assistant general manager and purchasing agent. The appointments heretofore made of Edward Dickinson as general superintendent, J. A. Monroe, as general freight agent, and J. S. Tebbets as general passenger agent are confirmed, and the individuals named will continue to perform the duties of their several offices. Mr. Erastus Young will continue as auditor. As such he will, as heretofore, report directly to the comptroller at Boston, and receive orders only from the comptroller's office; but he will act in harmony and full understanding with the vice-president, and carefully regard any suggestion he may make."

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—An extra of the World (dem.) says: At seven o'clock, the probabilities are that General Benjamin Harrison, of Indiana, has been chosen President of the nation, and Levi P. Morton, of New York, Vice-President. Returns thus far received indicate that the tariff reform issue has proven the strongest in states hopelessly republican. In Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska, the democratic ticket made large gains upon the lines foreshadowed in the recent tariff debate in the House. These gains, though encouraging, have not been sufficient to offset the republican majorities in these states and have therefore been of no material advantage to the national democratic ticket. On the other hand, the tariff issue has not proven strong in the doubtful states, particularly New York. The democratic members of the ways and means committee have been re-elected. They represent solidly democratic districts in the main, however, though there can be no doubt of the popularity of the tariff issue among their constituents. From latest advices, the probably republican gains in the south and east will exceed all expectations. A careful compilation of the congressional returns received at this hour would indicate that the republicans will control the next House by from eight to ten majority.

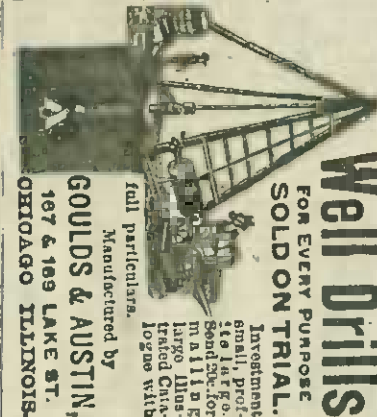
