FORTY VOTES GAINED BY ROLAPP

Judge Morse Still Passing on Challenged Ballots-Hearing Adjourned Till Monday.

HAPPY WEDDING CHIMES.

\$20,000 Damage Sult for Loss of Leg-Clark Recitals-Fuserals Sunday-News Briefs.

ngden, Utah, March 11 .- As a result the recounting of ballots to date, in e judgeship contest case, Howell has net loss of 40 votes. He lost 34 votes in Weber county, so that Rolapp cared it by 22 instead of Howell carrying it by 12, as appeared by the rerns of the judges of election as certifed by the board of canvassers. This would mean a net gain of 34 for Rolapp in Weber county. Two districts in Morgan county were completed by the count of the challenged ballots, of recount of the challenged ballots, of Milton, where Howell lost four, and Pe-tersob, where he lost two, making a total net loss of 40 on the recount to date. During the recount of challenges in the two Morgan county districts Indge Morgar county districts indge morse refused to sustain chal-lenges on the ground that names had been written in the ballots by other than the votors. This is taken as an indication that the ballots of North and South Morgan, where the judges had written names of Republican can-diates for precinct officers on the tikets, will be counted. However, there are other questions affecting each particular district, and each particular

particular district, and each particular ballot, so that it is impossible to pre-det what the rulings will be. In Davis county a large number of allots have been challenged because he judges folded them improperly and such a manner that when the voter a such a manner that when the voter and returned the ballot to the judge of election the latter could—in fact, he must-in tearing off the end of the tickst, open it sufficiently so that he could see whether or not there was a could see whether or not there was a cross under the Republican emblem or jes. The result, also, of folding the halots in this way was that in tearing off the ends of the voigd ballots the judge tore off also the entire lower part of the ticket, removing the names of candidates for justice of the peace and constable, and making it a disfig-ured ballot.
