PARKE HEADS HIS TEAM.
University of Utah Graduate Captain of Pennsylvania Debaters.

In a personal letter received from the University of Pennsylvania at the "News" office it is stated, that Friday evening next Dale H. Parke of Salt Lake will lead the Pennsylvania team in debate against Cornell. The debate is to be held at Ithaca, and Pennsylvania will defend the negative side of the question. It is resolved that our legislation should be shaped toward the gradual abandonment of the protective tariff. During the past two years Parke has captained the Pennsylvania team that have won the intercollegiate championship.

Mr. Parke is a graduate of the University of Utah in 1906 with the degree of bachelor of science. He is now a senior in the law department of the University of Pennsylvania. Each year he has won a place on the honor list in the final examinations for the year's work. During the last two years he has been chosen by the law faculty as a member of the board of editors of the American Law Register. This is considered the highest honor that can be won by a student in the law school. Parke has also taken an active part in the college activity at Pennsylvania, being a member of the general student council of the James Wilson Law club, and of the Delta Chi fraternity. It is his intention to return to this city and take up the practice of law.

PLAN INCLUDES IMPORTANT WARD

Orthopedic Gallery to be Added
To the Groves L. D. S.
Hospital.

CORRECTS ABNORMALITIES.

Science Comparatively New Treats And Prevents Deformity of Various Portions of the Human Body.

Among the improvements under way at the Groves L. D. S. hospital, and which are all but completed, is an entirely new feature, an orthopedic gallery. Orthopedics is a science for the correction or prevention of deformity of any part of the body; a branch of plastic surgery. A dozen years ago, little or nothing was known of the means now employed along the lines indicated; now there are at least eight colleges in the United States giving exclusive attention to the subject. Of these institutions, two are in New York city, one in St. Louis. The man who has done more, perhaps, than any other person in promoting the new science is Dr. Edward H. Angle, of St. Louis, who is the author of an elaborate work on the subject.

The achievements of orthopedics border on the marvelous. Bones can be so altered that they cannot be corrected, and in many cases brought to the condition nature intended. One of the principal branches of orthopedics is orthodontia—a jaw-breaking word, but a jaw-making science. It means the correction of the abnormal position of the jaw and the teeth. Teeth that are so much out of line as to be not only unsightly but manifestly injurious, are moved forward or backward at the will of the operator, until harmony is restored or perhaps brought about for the first time in the life of the patient.

Orthodontia, then, is surgical dentistry, and this branch of orthopedics will doubtless have first place in the department of the hospital. The new up-to-date Groves L. D. S. hospital, as stated, the science is scarcely more than 12 years old, and in this city it has been in vogue now about two years, there being but one practitioner, namely, Dr. F. Leslie Gower, who has with delight the establishment of the ward at the hospital.

VETERAN FIREMEN NIGHT REUNION.
Volunteers of the Old Days Meet in Pleasing Function in Canyon Road.

One of the most pleasing functions of Washington's birthday was that of the Volunteer firemen. The veterans, with their families and a number of friends, met at the society's hall on canyon road in the early evening, and for several hours the place was filled with animation and good cheer. President George M. Otinger presided, and among the special guests were W. H. Gioro, chief of the regular fire department, and Chief of Police Samuel M. Barlow.

At 6 o'clock a sumptuous banquet was served. The program that followed consisted of addresses by Messrs. Gioro, Barlow and Otinger, the latter giving a brief history of the organization and telling many reminiscences of the manner in which the "boys" used to fight fires without money and without price. Others taking part in the rendition of the program were Miss Anna, Mrs. Sharp Otinger, Mr. and Mrs. H. Carlwell and Mr. Christian. The entertainment consisted of the following: James Peacock, chairman; William A. Cardwell, William Odd, J. W. Snell and H. Thuermer. The committee was assisted by the ladies committee, which also had in charge the banquet. This committee was composed of Mrs. F. Odd, Mrs. W. Cardwell, Mrs. H. Taylor, Mrs. L. Simpson, Mrs. J. W. Snell, Mrs. H. P. Burns, Miss Simpson, Miss Barnes and Miss Jane Knight.

The reunion was the ninth held by the society. All told, more than 200 men belonged at various times to the Volunteer fire department. Many of these have moved elsewhere, but it is known that at least 100 are dead. There are now less than two score actual members of the organization, and as most of them are well advanced in years, the number is year by year becoming less. Last evening about 150 persons enjoyed the entertainment provided by the veterans, and those who had been present at previous reunions pronounced the last to be the best of all.

FUNERAL OF MRS. TOMLINSON.
Mrs. Alice Tomlinson was buried in Mt. Olivet cemetery yesterday afternoon, after impressive services at St. Paul's Episcopal church. Rev. C. E. Perkins officiating. The obsequies were very largely attended, many of the congregation being principals and teachers of the public schools. With the deceased had been a close association. The following numbers were rendered by the full-voiced choir, "Lead Kindly Light" and "There is a Good Hope Far Away." A. J. Brink sang "Come Unto Me." The pallbearers were Principals W. W. Barton, W. J. McCoy, Oscar Van Cott, D. H. Prosser, E. D. Keeler and J. D. Combs.

Mrs. Tomlinson, who was 64 years of age, died Saturday, following an operation. She was a native of England, and had resided in Salt Lake about 20 years. One son, W. N. Tomlinson, who resides at Whittier, Cal., survives her.

A QUARTERMASTER'S DILEMMA
