Will It Be McKinley and Roosevelt, or Bryan and Stevenson?-Amusingly Ridiculous Assurances in Tribune and Herald-"Specials" to Order.

How will the election go? Will it be McKinley and Roosevelt or will it be Beyon and Sievenson? What political wisencre is astute enough to tell-what committee chairman so thoroughly informed on campaign matters as to have absolute knowledge on these questions?

And yet, the strong partisans, the directing geniuses of each of the big polltical organizations, both Republican and Democratic have the thing settled to a definite certainty in their own minds, while the party organs, the newspapers, give assurances that no one must have the temerity to correct. They are set forth as "official," as the very quintessence of a demonstration in which there can be no element of doubt or failure. In Utah the Tribune deciares with wonderful wisdom that the Democrats are "beaten to a standstill" both locally and in the nation. On the other hand the Herald endowed with similar power for peering into the future and prognosticating results, promulgates the announcement that a huge Democratic "tidal wave" is sweep. ing the land and that nothing can prevent that party from attaining a magnificent victory.

This morning the Herald and Tribune both have eastern specials of the assuring kind. The former in glaring headlines says that the "Republican Managers are Thoroughly Scared," and "Every Indication Is That Hanna Knows He is Surely Beaten." The Tribune has the country safe for McKinley. including the headline statement that the "Campaign Managers at National Committee Headquarters are Strong in the Belief That He will Carry This State."

But these antipodal indulgences are no less amusing that the Herald reports of Republican railies in Utah or than the Tribune accounts of local Democratic meetings. So thoroughly divergent are these reports that the fair minded, unprejudiced, fact-seeking reader is left completely in the dark as to the exact truth when dependent upon the party papers. In proof of this statement the "News" this evening publishes a few excerpts in parallel columns of accounts of meetings held last night and reported by the party organs this morning. They follow immediately after the Eastern forecast "specials."

[Tribune Special.]

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 1.-The receipt of a poll of Utah, taken by the Repub-licans of that State, caused deep grati-fication to Republican national commit-

"The poll shows a majority of 525 for McKinley," said Vice Chairman Payne, in giving out the Intelligence. "These figures are most conservative and are much more likely below than above the mark. The poll, I am assured, was taken with unusual care and accuracy." The campaign managers here now talk of Utah with much confidence. Barly in the campaign the leaders were disposed to place it in the Bryan col-umn, but now the Impression is strong that McKinley will carry the State.

MAJORITIES IN MIDDLE WEST. Mr. Payne today, for the first time, gave the size of the majorities the na-tional committee expected in various States in the Middle West. He pre-dicted the Republicans would carry II-linois by 100,000, Ohio by 75,000, Michi-gan by 75,000, Indiana by from 25,000 to 20,000, North Dakota by 10,000, South Dakota by 10,000, Minnesota by 40,000 to 50,000, Wisconsin by 100,000, Kansas by 25,006 to 30,000. gave the size of the majorities the na-25,000 to 30,000.

"It will be a tremendous landslinde for McKinley," said Mr. Payne. "The indications for Republican success are far stronger today than they were four years ago,

DONNELLY FOR MCKINLEY.

They have withdrawn all bets on Indiana and have also instructed their disburs-ing agents to offer no more bets that Ohlo, Maryland or West Virginia will go Republican. They have also scaled down their majorities on this State and Wisconsin. The actions of the Hanna managers during the past few days show that they are just beginning to realize that they are beaten.

to realize that they are beaten. While Ohio has all along been re-garded by the Democratic national committee as an extremely doubtful state, it now begins to look like a safe and sure thing for Bryan. Chairman Johnson of the national executive committee today gave out the statement

that a careful poll shows that the State will go for Bryan by 20,000. To illus-trate the extent of the Democratic fandsilde it is stated that in three townships that are named forty-six Republicans who voted for McKinley in 1896 will this year vote for Bryan. In Niles township, Trumbuli county, in which McKinley was born, there were but thirty-eight Bryan votes in 1896. This year there is a Democratic club of 480 members.

The Republican committee is mak-ing a special plea to voters in behalf of Grosyenor, and it looks as though he would certainly be defeated. Chairman Bernard of the Hamilton county com-mittee believes that Cincinnati and the county will be carried for Bryan. In 1896 McKinley had a plurality of 20,-
