There may also be many other occasions when it would be adviscases no reasonable person would ten dollars each; an amount which,

There may also be many other occasions when it would be advis-able for a man to horrow and pay interest, to prevent a seti-ous sacrifice, or to secure a great advantage. But as a rule of very general applicability, we should say, do not horrow, especi-ally at high rates of interest, unless it is mally advisable to do so. Do not involve younselves in liabilities to secure some merely speculative advantage. Do not compromise your property, only in cases in which it may be the best thing yon can do. MRS.
