#### THE PROCEEDINGS.

A. Rachofsky and others asked for an extension of watermains on Third South street from Fourth East to Ninth East street. Referred to the city engineer.

E. A.S. Nesbit asked for the construction of a sewer on Gatreet. Re-

ferred to the city engl eer.

George Forrester asked permission to lay a private waterpipe on his prem-

L. D. Kinney asked permission to construct a bridge across the Jordan river in Kinney's Copper Plant subdivision. Committee on streets with power to act.

William Mosgrove asked to be appointed special policeman for Franklin avenue without pay. Committee on

H. W. Lawrence et al asked that the rock pavements on West Temple street, hetween South Temple and Fourth South streets, be at least twelve feet in width. Board of public works.

J. S. Jensen sent in a communica- street, be not granted, unless petitioners tion stating that the huilding City creek of between Canyon road bridge and the mouth of the new aqueduct would endanger his property, and petitioned for relief. Referred to the city engineer.

Sam J. Kenyon et al asked that notice of intention for the grading and construction of graveled walks on Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh South streets, between Ninth East street and the military reservation, and on Tenth, Eleventh Twelfth and Thirteenth East streets between Fourth and Seventh Suth atreets. Referred to the city engineer for instructions.

J. E. Butler et al protested against the extension of sewers between Fourth and Fifth East streets on Second South. The protest being sufficient to defeat the extension, the notice now being published was ordered discontinued.

#### TO SEWER THE WEST SIDE.

Foliand offered the following which was referred to the city attorney:

Whereas, A large portion of Salt Lake City lay to the west is destitute of sew-erage facilities, therefore be it

Resolved, That the sewer committee and the city engineer present a feasible plan to sewer the same at an early date.

#### STOOD BY THE MAYOR.

Tre Council sustained the Mayor's veto of the curfew ordinance on a vote of 7 to 6.

#### ON PAY DAY.

The city paymaster suggested that the heads of the different departments be instructed to allow the men to quit work at four o'clock on pay days in order that they can be paid off by six o'clock. Committee on finance.

### TO REPUND THE DIFFERENCE.

City Treasurer Duke reported that A. H. Cannon et al had advanced money for water main extension on Eighth West, between Ninth and Tenth South streets, and suggested that the difference between the amount of their tax and the total amount advanced be refunded to them. Referred back for a more specific statement.

## BELONGS TO THE CITY.

The city treasurer submitted abstracts of title to all of blocks 177, 178, 179 and 180, plat D, Sait Lake City survey, showing that the real title of the property is in the city and that the persons who have been transferring eame have no right to do so. He also recommended that the tax sale against the said property be released, and that the taxes against the same for water main extension now amounts to \$2858. 63. Committee on public grounds and city attorney.

### FROM THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The board of public works reported that they had ordered the contractors on Main, First and Second South and West Temple streets to turnish flagstones for two crosswalks in each block, intermediate of the crosswalks constructed only over the stone portion of the street.

The board recommended that, the petition of E. J. Travis et al. asking permission to lay certain sidewalks on Second South street near East Temple

agree to lay a flagstone walk.

Also that the petition of Willard Young, asking permission to lay a flagstone sidewalk on South Temple street

be granted. Adopted.

The board recommended that H. W. Lawrence et al. be allowed sixty days to begin building operations on certain property, and if work is not begun in that time that they be required to lav a flagstone sidewalk, the selay being in accordance with a request from the petitioners. Adopted.

The board recommended that the petition of C. H. Crow, asking permission to lay a flagstone sidewalk on First South between Ninth and Tenth East atreets, he granted. Adopted.

The board reported adversely upon the petition of Willard Young et al., asking permission to substitute cement for flagstone walks on South Temple between State and Fourth East streets. Adopted.

#### FROM THE ENGINEER.

The city engineer reported that he had beed requested to subdivide lots 4 and five in block 9, and of block 8, plat C, and that the work involves the question of what width shall be given to Ninth West street through the proposed subdivision, and recommended tnat the matter be referred to the street committee. Adopted,

The same official submitted a profile showing street and sidewalk grades on Eleventh East street between City Creek caryon and the city cemetery. Referred to committee on streets.

The same official submitted plats of Kinney's Cosper Plant subdivision, and stated that there were some deficiencies in the same which should be corrected without delay. The plats were approved subject to change.

The same official submitted his quarterly report showing that the expenditures for the quarter amounted \$4283.80 and the receipts to \$525.65. Filed,

# BUILDING INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

The building inspector submitted his quarterly report as follows: Number of permits issued, 89; value of improvements, \$181,463. Filed.
