FASCINATING OPERA HOOD.

The fascinating confection in evening wear is this rather voluminous but altogether bewitching opera hood. The foundation, which also is the hood's lining, is of white tulle silk and over this is ruched and shirred the finest of white point d'esprit. The inside is faced three inches back with ruffled white chiffon and the face ruffles are of pleated chiffon and the point d'esprit edged with ruchings of maline to give them the needed support. The neck of the hood is drawn closely about the throat and fastens in front with long knotted ties of chiffon cascaded with net. A deep net ruffle surmounting one of the chiffon makes an appropriate neck finish and adds warmth about the shoulders.
