The "chinock" thut takes its birth under equatorial skies now breathes balmily neroes the prairies, sinking the snow banks in its path and setting the lakes awash wilt slush and rotten ice. It is a wonderful wind the "chinock." Away to the southwest where the Rockies rear their great snowbound summits, clouds that lie low and fleegy on the horizon begin to form stretching from southeast to northwest as far as the eye can see. the unfailing tokens that usher in the melting winds which mean to man and beast alike, freedom from the tyranny of cold. According to the oldest io-habitant, the Indians and musk rats, none of whom have proven very re-liable in the past, we are to have an open winter, but as all signs fall in Canada we who are here are looking for what we will get. We had a seed fair recently and the government officials who came as indees said the showing of wheat had been unequalled in their experience. One especially clean sample weighd 65 pounds to the bushel and nothing weigh-ing iess than 664, pounds to the bushel was considered as a possibility as a grize winner. Never had they weighed such wheat, and one of them, an old Nebrask farmer, but now a Canadiar, said this district should produce as good wheat as could be raised on carth. It may be estimated how good it was when the lowest sample winder they are say, is Alberta Red, a winter wheat, our spring wheat failing a little less in weight, being 65 pounds to the bushel and that produces this seed and which will run from 40 to 69 bushels to the acre in winter wheat, and from 30 to 50 bushels in spring wheat, is sell-ing at from \$10 to \$25 per acre.
