dreds of miles of desert wastes still to pass before its long march across the continent would be completed, filed out of the Guadaloupe canyon and camped on the head of the San Barnadino creek, the first "Mormons" to tread what is now Mexican soil. From this

point they marched west to the San Pedro, and from there northwest to Tueson and on to California. Had they gone south on the San

Bernadino a distance of thirty-five miles they would have reached a point where that creek forms a junction with the Bavispe river, where the Latterday Saints have just established another outpost, the advance guard in the conquest of peace which they are steadily pushing to the south.

In the fall of 1875 D. W. Jones, accompanied by Helaman Pratt, J. Z. Stewart, R. H. Smith, Ammon M. Tenny, Wiley C. Jones and the undersigned, left Utah to carry the Gospel into Mexico, and explore and report to President Young the facilities offered by the country traversed for colonization. There were at that time no Latter-day Saints on the Little Colorado nor in the beautiful Salt River valley. where so many of our people have since found homes. These localities were explored, the party passed into Mexico by way of El Paso, reached the city of Chihuahua, went west to the Sierra of the county's lien.

Madre and following north along its base, passed over the ground where Colonia Dublan is now located, and near where Colonia Juarez and Diaz have since been established. Meetings were held, hundreds of copies of selec-tions from the Book of Mormon, translated into the Spanish language were distributed, after which the party returned to the United States and later to Utah.

The following year, 1877, Helaman Pratt and J. Z. Stewart, returned to Mexico, preaching the Gospel in the States of Sonora and Chihuahua. Next came the introduction of the Gospel in the City of Mexico by Apostle Moses

Thatcher, and later the movement which resulted in the permanent establishment of colonies in the States of and Sonora, Colonia Chlhuahua Oaxaca, on the Bavispe river, being in the latter State.

Investigation proved that the ranch was for sale, but the price de-manded was beyond our reach. In January, 1898, the locality was again visited and a more critical examnation made. The result was more sat isfactory than the previous visit had been, and a renewed effort was made to effect a purchase. Negotiations were continued, with varied prospects of success, until on Dec. 4, 1899, the title to the Batapito and Rushallo ranches passed from the owner, Colin Cameron, to the Mexican Colonization and Agricaltural company. On the day that this deal was consummated, Apostle A. O. Woodruff and Sister A. W. McCune started from Colonia Dublan, their objective point being the Batapito, distant 175 miles, by the route traveled, via Colonia Diaz and Oaxaca. On the 10th they were joined at Oaxaca by the writer and Hyrum S. Harrie, and the following day the party, accompanied by a number of brethren and sisters from Oaxaca, drove down and camped on the bank of the river upon the ground where we all hope to see, in the near future, a prosperous and happy community.
