The Moors Are Reported to Have Been Shot Down in Large Numbers.

TO MAKE ORDER IN MOROCCO.

European Powers Agree to France and Spain Undertaking Task-Will Adhere to Algeeiras Compact.

Tanglers, Aug. 6 .- Casa Blauca, on the Moroccan coast, has been bombarded by French cruisers, the Moors are reported to have been shot down in large numbers, and the town since last Sunday night has been practically in the possession of landing parties from French and Spanish cruisers. The first shots were fired by the Moors. The French responded with a bayonet charge and the bombardment of the native quarter with melinito shells. The French had six men wounded, but no one killed. No European residents were

one killed. No European residents were hurt. The occupation of Casa Blanca is a direct outcome of the native uprising which resulted in the killing last week of eight Europeans.there. Both France and Spain are hurrying other warships with troops and marines on board to various points on the Moroccan coast for the protection of foreigners. Un-der the terms of the Algeciras conven-tion these two powers are charged with the policing of seaports or Moroc-co, and their action at Casa Blanca has brought no protest from any power.

The states of Europe have expressed their willingness that France and Spain restore order in Morocco. No other countries are involved. News of fighting at Casa Blanca was brought here by the steamer Anatole. On Saturday night the French maval officer in command informed the Moor-ish authorities that he was going to land a force for the protection of the French consul. Authorization to do so was given. The force went ashore Sun-day morning at daybreak. The French-men were no sconer on the beach than they were fired upon by Moorish sol-diers, and in this first encounter the French force sustained all its casual-ties. The Frenchmen fought their way to the consulte and then signaled the cruiser Gallee to bombord the native quarter. The Galilee at once opened upon the Moors. She was joined at 11 o'clock by the French cruisers Du Chay-la, and both fired until 2,000 rounds of ammunition had been expended. This fire is said to have been disastrous to the Arabs. The batteries on a fort at the mouth of the harbor fired at once on the French cruisers, but it was quickly silenced and reduced.

A third party from the Spanish cruiser Don Alvara de Ba-zan was landed and occupied the Span-ish consulate. The European quarter of Casa Blanca was not damaged. The remainder of the European resi-dents of Casa Blanca are either at their respective consulates or have taken refuge on board a German and Eng-lish vessel in the harbor. France and Spain have agreed on

France and Spain have agreed on the terms of a France-Spanish note in-forming the powers signatory to the Al-gedras convention, including the Unit-ed States, of their intention to keep within the terms of the convention in dealing with the situation in Morocco. The next measures to be adopted de-pends largely upon what develops at Casa Blanca as a result of the occu-pation of that town.

ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.

Marseilles, France, Aug. 6.—A trunk belonging to a man and woman who arrived here today from Monte Carlo attracted the attention of the bag-gagemaster, who caused it to be open-ed. It was found to contain the body of a woman cut to pleces. The man and woman owning the trunk were arrested. They had asked that it be forwarded to London. The couple, who are middle aged and gave the names of Mr. and Mrs. Gold, residents of Monte Carlo, denied that they committed the crime and in-formed the examining magistrate that they knew the victim only slightly.

While the latter was at their home, the Villa Melesimy, on Sunday last, Mr. and Mrs. Gold added, the woman's Mr. and Mrs. Gold added, the woman's lover arrived the and blew out her brains. The Golds fearing they would be compromised, tried to get rid of the corpse. The head and feet were in the Golds' value and the rest of the body was in the trunk. The autopsy seemed to upset the story told by the Golds. It was shown that the murdered woman was seized from behind and held while she was stabbed to death. A commission has been sent to Monte Carlo to investi-gate the crime.

OFFICER REPRIMANDED FOR INSULTING LETTER.

Washington, Aug. 6 .- A courtman Washington, Aug. 6.—A courtmar-tial which recently convened at Fort Monroe, Va., found First Lieut. George A. F. Trumbo, Twelfth United States cavairy, not guilty of the charge of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman, but guilty of conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, in writing the following let-ter to Mrs. Little Sims in reference to her son, an enlisted man who had served under him:

Va.: "Dear Madam—It gives me great pleasure to inform you that your son, Earl Sims, who is about the most worthless scoundrel I ever saw, is a deserter from the United States army, "I sincerely hope to see him behind the bars for at least two years. Hope this will be a source of condolence to you, I am, Very respectfully, "GEORGE A. F. TRUMBO, "First Lieutenant."

The country has not yet attained that state when the executive and fu-dicial departments are important, so the system of justice is regarded as a thing to be farmed out; bribery is gen-eral, innocent people are convicted and the property confiscated, and the guilty are liberated. All this, says the pamphlet, is being reformed by the Japanese. The work of reforming the currency system has progressed, the gold stafidard being adopted, and pri-vate coinage prohibited, while the cir-culation of notes has been encouraged and a new revenue system adopted. In conclusion the pamphlet says the Japanese have provided the Koreans with a code of laws, among other things safeguarding the transfer of real exit of immigrants, and encouraging the development of productive indus-tries.
