Also, that the committee inform itself theroughly as to Mon-tana's state lows governing marriage and divorce and formulate recommendations as to improvement of same, with a view to furthering uniformity in such laws, throughout the United States Also, that this committee look into exlating conditions of neglected and abused children and animals, and endenvor to encourage state protection for the same. . . .
