OBITUARY.

Johansen.—At Spring City, Sanpete County, Utah Territory, December 9, 1893, Lars Johansen, of old age being 91 years, 10 months and 1 day. Deceased was born February 8th, 1792, in Hammerbus, Hammer Sogn, Welle Amt, Denmark.

He, his wife and some of their children were among the first that were baptized in the southern part of Utah, Denmark, in August, 1851. His son Christian J. Larsen who now resides in Logan, Cache County, officiated. Four of his sons had the previous year embraced the gospel in the city of Copenhagen, under the administration of Praelud Snow, and then returned to their former home to preach the truth in that locality, and their parents and the three remaining children were among the first to obey it, and upon their house for the missionaries, who always found with them a hearty home until the fall of 1863, when Father Larsen (as he was commonly called) his wife and three children emigrated to Utah, and arrived in Salt Lake City on the 5th day of October following.

After his arrival in the valleys, Father Larsen made Kingston's Fort or West Weber, Weber County, his home, until 1868 when he during the time of the "move" started south with the Church, and went as far as Ephraim, in Sanpete Valley, where he lived till the year 1881, when he and his wife moved to Spring City, where several of his sons had then located, and where he resided until his demise.

He was universally respected among all people in every community where he lived, being an unassuming, industrious, honest and upright man.

Father Larsen has a numerous posterity, namely, seven children, five sons and two daughters, who are all alive, and in good standing in the Church, ninety-three grandchildren and forty-six great-grandchildren. Scandinavian papers please copy.
