

YOUNG FORGER BROUGHT TO BOOK

Sheriff Sebring Preparing Papers
Against Morse Cohen. Now
Doing Time in Cheyenne.

PETERSON-CLARK NUPTIALS.

Deputy Sheriff Surprises Friends—
Tardiness Costs N. C. Mortensen
\$100—News Notes.

Ogden, Nov. 8.—Sheriff Sebring is now preparing charges with County Attorney Harris against a young man who gives his name as Morse Cohen, on one count he will be charged with forging the name of Joseph Cohen to a check for \$50, which was cashed by Schenfield, the Twenty-fifth street merchant, and a second charge of obtaining money by false pretense, that of securing \$100 from Rosenthal, the pawn broker on a worthless check. Cohen committed the offenses over four months ago. The two checks were dated Denver, June 27, 1907. He claimed they were sent him by his father, but on presentation at the banks both checks were worthless.

After passing the checks he immediately left Ogden and went to Cheyenne where he turned similar tricks. The officers of Cheyenne and Ogden located him at Des Moines, Iowa, and he was taken back to Cheyenne, found guilty of the charge and is now serving 90 days at that city. Requestion papers for him will be gotten out and an officer will go to Cheyenne and get him when his time is up there. The charges against him in Ogden are petty offenses, so that if substantiated he will not doubt get a term in the state prison.

TARDINESS COSTS HIM \$100.

For being late yesterday it cost N. C. Mortensen of Ogden Valley, \$100, he had put up for his appearance to answer to the district court on the charge of having trout in his possession out of season. Mortensen was arrested some time ago on complaint of the fish and game warden. He put up \$100 for his appearance when the case should be called, and yesterday he did not put in an appearance at the appointed hour and his bail was forfeited. He appeared a short time later, but the court could do nothing for him.
