LOCAL BRIEFS.

The north-bound passenger came down the track on which the boy was standing, but he was not seen by the engineer until it was too late. The boy was thrown from the track and lay on the ground. Grant ran in front of the engine and threw himself between it and the boy. The engine stopped, and the boy was rescued. Grant was injured, but he is now recovering.
