EVENTS THAT DRAW CROWDS

Football Games Appear to Attract Greater Attendance Than Others.

Football Games Appear to Attract Greater Attendance Than Others.

Various big sporting events have drawn immense crowds in this country in recent years, but there is a dispute as to which is the largest in point of actual paid admissions. The tendency to swell the figures has made it impossible for the average layman properly to gage the size of a crowd, whether, at a race track, a baseball game, a football game, a pridle fight or some other event of similar public interest.

The attendance figures on Brooklyn handleap day at Gravesend, on Suburban handleap day at Sheepshead Bay, and no Futurity day, also at the bay, have been placed all the way from 30,000 to 50,000 persons. A conservative estimate of last season's Futur 'y crowd placed the attendance at about 40,000, as the Pinkertons maintained that the turnstiles showed figures in close priximity to the mark. In Chicago it was claimed two years ago that 60,000 persons saw the American Derby won at Washington Park, but about half that number were present according to eye witnesses.

It has been conceded by fight promoters that the largest crowd that ever attended a glove contest between notable puglists saw Corbett and McCoy meet at Madison Square Garden soveral years ago. While an estimate of £5,000 spectators was printed by some newspapers, it is a fact that not more than 10,000 persons were able to get inside of the arena, the seating capacity of which exclusive of the floor space, is something less than 6,000. The managers of various big baseball clubs have given out attendance figures running all the way from 21,000 to 3,000, but Manager Selee of the Chicago Nationals says that no game ever played in the country has drawn more than 25,000 persons. Taking into consideration all of the large crowds referred to above, it is still maintained that none of them eclipsed the attendance at the Harvard-Vale football game played in the stadium at Cambridge, in 1902. This remarkable structure, which has a seating capacity of 35,000, was jammed so that standing roo

NEGRO ASSAULTS A RENO WOMAN.

Struck Her With an Axe as She Lay in Bed, Then Dragged Her to a Woodshed.

WAS COING TO BEHEAD HER.

Was Frightened Away by Her Children-Suspect Narrowly Escapes Being Lynched.

Reno. Nev., Jan. 20,-An attempt was made to lynch a negro about noon today, because he was suspected of having tried to kill Mrs. James E. Harper, a prominent woman of this place, who is so badly injured she cannot recover.

The assault upon Mrs. Harper was made this morning, while Mr. Harper was away from home. The negro entered the house, and with an ax struck the woman as she lay in the bed with her two children. He then dragged her body into a woodshed and was preparing to sever her head from the body when he was frightened away by the children rushing to the house of a neighbor for assistance. When help arrived the man was gone.

About noon a strange negro was arrested by a citizen, and the right of the man taking his prisoner to the county fall at the point of a shotgun caused the speedy formation of a mobof a thousand people. A rope was secured, but a cordon of followenen surrounded the negro and fought through the crowd to the jail. Court was going on in the courthouse, but it was quickly adjourned and Judge Curwas quickly adjourned and Judge Cur-ler addressed the excited mob, coun-

The mob has partially disbanded, but the officers fear that another attempt to lynch will be made tonight. The negro arrested partially answers the description given by the Harper chil-

No motive is known for the assault on Mrs. Harper,

The authorities protest that the negro is not in Washoe county tonight, say-ing that he has been spirited to Caj-

son, where he is now safely behind the walls of the state's prison. At 8 o'clock tonight the crowd be-gan to swell in numbers and fearful of an assault, the sheriff asked that a committee be appointed to search the all. This was done and after going

jail. This was done and after going through the building the committee returned to the jail yard and announced that it had visited all the cells and found the prisoner absent.

Tonight the jail is heavily guarded. Thirty or 40 men, carrying Winchesters, are patrolling the street in front of the big brick and steel building.

Mrs. Harper is still alive. Her skull is fearfully crushed where she was struck by the ax, and she is lying in an unconscious condition. Her husan unconscious condition. Her hi band, who arrived today, suspects Mexican named Manuel Lopez, with whom he has had trouble, and who is said to have threatened his life. Lopez was in the city last night but cannot be found today.

POLITICAL CONSPIRACY UNCOVERED IN COLORADO.

Pueblo, Colo. Jan. 20 .- The grand jury which has for two months been inves-tigating the election frauds in Pueblo county, reported to the court today and was discharged. One hundred new in dictments were returned. The repor

was discharged. One hundred new indictments were returned. The report went fully into the investigation as made by the grand jury and was a complete exposure of the frauds committed in Pueblo county.

The grand jury, on which Democrats and Republicans had equal representation, reports the discovery of a conspiracy, with its fountain head in Denver, to control the election in this county by corrupt methods.

"We learn," says the report, "that the better element of our community, deluded by the proud belief that by their suffrages they were determining the affairs of our city and county and deciding the destiny of the nation, was

deciding the destiny of the nation, was two, three, a dozen, 50 times over-bal-anced by venal repeaters and the manu-facture of hundreds of fictitious regis-trations by officers sworn to righteous-

"Nearly 1,300 foreigners received naturalization papers during September and October, 1904, from the county court and in many fustances they were issued to alians who had never even applied for their first papers, but were is sued to them as minors who had been in this country from two months to two years, and in almost every instance were in excess of 18 years of age when they left their native land."

The jury petitions the court to bring the evidence of fraudulent naturaliza-tions to the attention of the United States district court and the United States district attorney.

The jury found that the registration books were padded to the extent of at least 1,000 names. Under the practise of paying political workers in vogue the vouching system, says the report, has becom, "worse than a farce!"
