Development Retarded Because Timber Cannot be Cut on Public Lands.

New York, March 23 .-- A special to the Herald from Washington says: Serious embarrassment has l been

caused the administration and the development of the Philippines has been retarded by the legislation prohibiting the cutting of timber on the public lands of the archipelago. As the for-ests are on public lands the government, under a strict interpretation of law, will be unable to authorize the felling of a tree to provide the planks necessary for the construction of a new house or the repairing of an old one. If a gunboat were to lose a spar and her commander desired to replace it he could not take it from the public lands without violating the law. Not only is the sale or lease of timber pro-hibited but the sale or lease or other disposition of public lands and the granting of mining rights are made illegal
