Field to Locate Line.

Field to Locate Line. Rumors which have reached Ely from time to time, says the White Pine News, concerning the building of a rail-way from Pioche to this point, are giv-en considerable color by report which was generally noised about the city yesterday, concerning the starting of a party of surveyors from Pioche into the hills, supposedly to start the work of surveying the line to Ely. UTAH ANTIMONY.

Government Report on the Deposits Of Garfield County.

Of Garfield County. Deposits of antimony on Coyote creek, in Garfield county, southern Utah, have been worked spasmodic-ally since 1880, and it is reported that more than \$100,600 worth of ore has been shipped from this region. The rise in the price of antimony in 1905 and 1906 led to renewed activity in developing the neglected deposits in the United States, and after an un productive period extending over several years, 295 tons, part of which came from Utah, were mined in this country in 1906.

several years, 295 tons, part of Which canne from Utah, were mined in this country in 1966. In September, 1907, Mr. George B. Richardson, one of the geologists of the United States geological survey, made a brief visit to Coyote creek and examined the deposits and the prepara-tions that had been made for active mining. His report on this investiga-tion has recently been published by the survey in an advance chapter from Bulletin 340, which forms part 1 of "Contributions to Economic Geology, 1907." Copies of this report may be obtained by addressing the director of the survey at Washington, D. C. Coyote creek, a branch of the east fork of Sevier river, occupies a short, narrow valley in the northwestern part of Garfield county, in the high plateaus of Utah, whose geology was described 28 years ago. The anti-mony camp is about 40 miles by road southeast of Marysvale, the terminus of the Sanpete and Sevier branch of the Rio Grande Western railway, and stands at an elevation of about 7,000 feet above the sen level.
