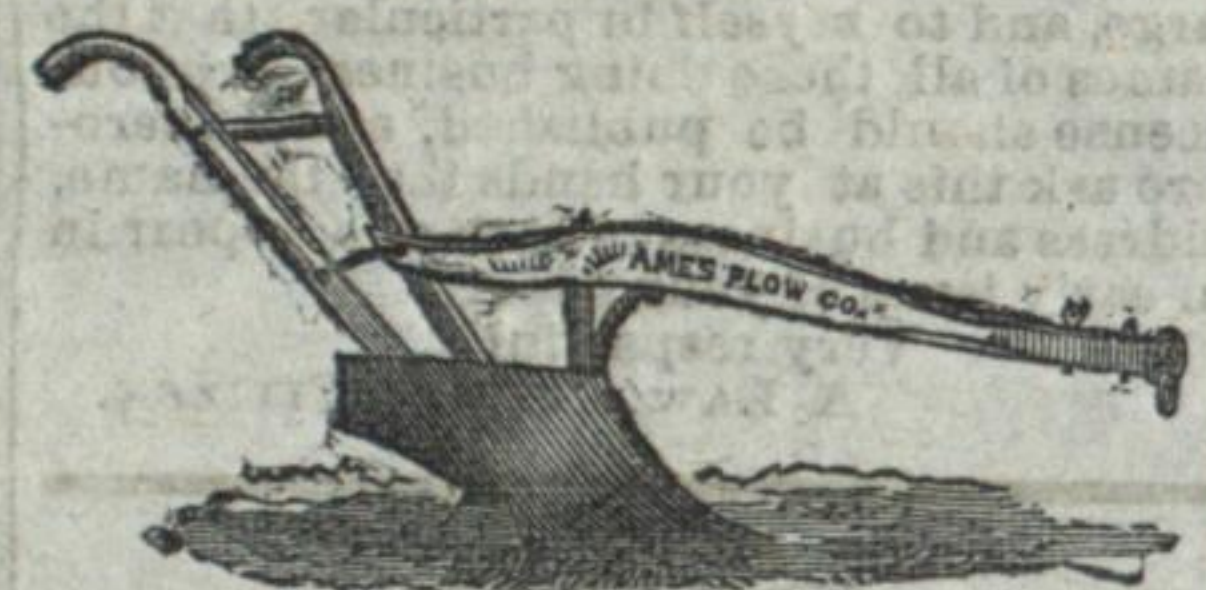

MISCONCEIVED.—Washington, February 6.—The decision of the United States Supreme Court yesterday in the Stout habeas corpus case, involving the Mormon question, is misconceived. The four Judges deciding against the jurisdiction did so solely on the ground of technical objections to the nature of the writ, without considering the merits of the subject. The four Judges maintaining the jurisdiction based their opinions on the general merits of the case, irrespective of the character of the writ. It is known that on the merits the entire Bench sustain the jurisdiction, and regard all present proceedings legally void. A civil case involving the same question is on the docket.—St. Louis Dispatch.
