"All I can say is that conditions are very threatening and uncertain. There is a great area of very low pressure over the west. The barometer is falling and has been falling for several days with the result that it looks very much as though we will have rain to-merrow. I cannot definitely predict it as it may blow away: but I think we have rain and cooler weather beginning tomorrow.
