Detroit, Mich., May 22 .- The biennial ovention of the Switchmen's Union of North America adopted a resolution rotesting against the "alleged kidnapping" of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and requesting President Rooseyelt to use all legitimate means in his power to secure a reversal of the recent decision "legalizing the kidnap-

ent decision "legalizing the kinnap-ng." The resolution was adopted bankmonaly by the 250 delegates, who present every state in the Union, rep-senting a membership of 23,000. The resolution declares that laws rel-live to the protection and liberty of 1 American citizens in procuring de-new were denied these brothers by all American citizens in procuring de-dense were denied these brothers by the governors of Colorado and Idaho, and that their removal to the scene of the Steunenberg murder constituted a "pure and simple case of kidnapping." "The resolution continues: "And, whereas, President Roosevelt here scene fit to use the applied process."

"And, whereas, President Roosevelt has seen fit to use the public press in expressing sentiments that Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone were 'unde-sirable citizens,' and previously re-ferred to the Western Federation of Minera' officials as having been impli-

Miners officials as having been cated in the murder; and, "Whereas, such statements stand without precedent in the civilized world, and we believe said statements well affect these brothers in fail in Idaho, condemning them before trial;

Resolved. That the Switchmen's Resolved, that the switchmen's Union of North America, in convention assembled, denounces the series of out-rages instituted against these brothers, believing it a serious blow to Ameri-can citizenship and good government; he is insther

can citizenship and good government; be it further "Resolved, That a copy of these reso-lutions be forwarded to President Roosevelt requesting that he use all the legitimate means in his power to com-pel the courts to reverse the recent de-cision legalizing the kidnapping of these brothers, and obey the intent of the Constitution as to the rights of men."

men." Copies were ordered forwarded to the governors of Idaho and Colorado, and to Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. A resolution was also adopted today urging every member of the organiza-tion to become prominent in politics and to work for men who favor meas-ures beneficial to himself, regardless of party. of party.
