By means of the following process the presence of wool in a piece of silk less than half an inch square can be detected in a very short time. A half grain of the material is to be boiled in about a half an inch of potash lye, to which about ten times as much distilled water is to be added. To one third of a cubic inch of this liquid a few drops of a solution of nitro prusside of sodium are to be added. If no violet tinge is developed, the experimenter may be assured that there is not the least fragment of wool mixed with the silk.

The Czar has published an ukase, abolishing the hereditary character of the Russian priesthood, which is now a caste comprising 700,000 families. The right to obtain ordination is now extended to all, while a priest's son can parake himself to ordinary life. It is probable that the motive of this remarkable measure, which has almost escaped attention in Western Europe, was to break up in a powerful impetus in imperio; but its effect will probably be to dissolve the ice-like rigidity and coldness of the Russian ecclesiastical system.
