METHODS OF IRRIGATION.

THE American Agriculturist for December has an article with illustrations upon some methods of ir-

rigation. Though naturally a moist country, England is in the advance in regard to improved methods of A correspondent, of the Tribune, irrigation. One of those methods irrigation. One of those methods is by the use of perforated pipes, called the Stoke Park system, to which we referred a short time since. A system similar to this is also applied or proposed for the watering of structs. On the Stoke Park estate of Mr. E. J. Colman, a twelve horse power engine, wor-king a force pump, draws water a twelve horse power engine, wor-king a force pump, draws water from a reservoir and forces it with a pressure of seventy-five pounds per square inch through a se-ries of pipes perforated with small holes in the sides. These pipes are fed by subterranean iron supply fed by subterranean iron supply pipes, to which they are faid down was flung to the breeze.
