

ALDRICH URGES CURRENCY REFORM

Makes it Plain That His Great Aim in Future Will be to Accomplish This Object.

HE DESIRES CO-OPERATION.

If Delegated to Draw Up a Plan, He Would be at a Loss to Know How to Proceed.

St. Louis, Nov. 8.—With emphasis even stronger than in his Chicago speech, Senator Aldrich made it evident to the business men of St. Louis today and tonight that it is his purpose to devote himself to the work of reforming the currency system of the United States. He spoke briefly today before a limited gathering of bankers at the Noonday club, and more extensively tonight before the Commercial club.

SPEAKS INFORMALLY.

Senator Aldrich spoke informally tonight. "I don't come to you with any plan of monetary reform," he said. "Indeed if I should be delegated today individually and personally to prepare a scheme for a new system of finance for the country, I should be at a loss to know how to proceed. I should find it necessary to enter upon a careful investigation and would not undertake to formulate anything without much more study than I have been able to give to this subject. Even in that event, I should want your advice and co-operation, and should ask your aid just as I am asking it now for the commission. I realize, as I know all of you do, the absolute necessity of reforming the currency upon the broadest national lines. The work to be done cannot be done by any one man nor by any set of men; it cannot be done by any one party, nor in the interest of any one section. It cannot be done by a commission or by Congress without the aid of the country at large.

"Our plan must be one that will take into consideration the wants of the town and of the country as well as those of the city. We cannot afford to attempt to legislate alone for New York or New Orleans or San Francisco, but we must legislate for St. Louis, Chicago, Denver, Louisville, Atlanta—for Springfield, Peoria and Little Rock.

WHAT SYSTEM MUST BE.

"Our system must be one that will satisfy the manufacturers of New England, the agriculturists of the Missis-

issippi valley, the miners of the Rocky mountains and the Pacific coast and the merchants of all sections. Surely the task before us is one of gigantic proportions; and the results of our efforts, good or bad, must depend not alone upon our own wisdom, but upon the assembled good judgment of the leading banking and commercial men of the entire nation.

"It is because I have come to realize the great magnitude of this work, and its limitless possibilities, beneficial or otherwise, that I come to you at this early stage in our proceedings, to tell you, not only for myself, but for the commission in so far as I can, just what we have done, and to ask your co-operation in our future proceedings. "A portion of the commission has visited the principal capitals of Europe, and some of our members have traveled somewhat through the United States in their investigations. Moreover we have published a number of monographs dealing with many phases of the banking question. These have been written by gentlemen who have the confidence of the commission, but who are not members of it. They have been instructed, however, to guard themselves from all prejudicial views; and they are intended not to shape the thought of the country, but simply to supply information upon which views may be based.

"From this time forward the commission will give attention largely to conditions in the United States, and we shall soon begin to call upon men in whose judgment we have confidence to present their views for our benefit. We especially desire suggestions from men of practical experience. We have enough already by way of contribution from cranks and demagogues.

ALMOST A PLAN.

"The nearest approach that Mr. Al-

drich made to any indication of a plan was his discussion of bank issues. He again said that European countries were quite agreed on that subject, and again referred to the circumstance that most of those countries maintained central banking institutions for the issuance of bank paper.

He stated, however, that it could not be expected that any European banking system could be transplanted in its entirety in this country, and he again pointed out the great necessity of finding a plan that would not disturb established banks nor interfere with the progress of business. Whatever system should be adopted, he said, must be one looking to gradual changes and must have due regard to vested interests and sectional usages. Again he assured his hearers of his desire to hold the subject entirely above political bias; he went into some detail to convince his audience that it would be impossible to adopt a system that would accomplish this desirable result.

Again, also, Mr. Aldrich dwelt upon the necessity of developing a system of credit that would protect the country against such disastrous results as were experienced during the banking panic of 1907. He expressed the decided opinion that with proper safeguards the country need not again submit to such a general crash as then was precipitated, with all its attendant evils.

NINE PERSONS LOSE LIVES IN EXPLOSION

New York, Nov. 8.—Nine persons are known to have lost their lives, and it is believed four or five more bodies may be found in the ruins, as the result of an explosion and fire in the bomb factory of Robert Morrison & Son on Columbia street, Brooklyn, today.

William F. Morrison, manager and part owner of the concern, is among the identified dead.

The other eight bodies recovered are all those of employees. Most of the bodies were badly burned.

The explosion caused a panic among the fifty employees and a score of men and women were injured in the rush to escape.

WATCHING PHYSICAL CONDITION OF SCHOLARS

New York, Nov. 8.—Statistics gathered from 358 cities in 42 states and the District of Columbia by the bureau of municipal research indicate a growing tendency of schools to closely watch the physical condition of their pupils. Of these cities 147 with a school population of 100,000 are making any attempt to discover transmissible diseases; 211 are inspecting for defective vision; 170 for breathing trouble, and 118 for bad teeth, while 104, with a population of 2,500,000, have no examination of any kind for their 600,000 school children. Fifty-five cities supply nurses to instruct parents at schoolhouses; 45 send nurses from house to house to instruct parents; 57 send out cards of instruction about tuberculosis, dental hygiene and diet, while 134 cities cooperate with dispensaries, hospitals and relief societies in the care of school children.

JAPANESE MAKE PILGRIMAGE TO HOME OF LAFCADIO HEARN

Cincinnati, Nov. 8.—A pilgrimage to many of the haunts of Lafcadio Hearn, the American-Japanese author, whose early home in this city constituted a part of the second day's entertainment in Cincinnati for the honorary consular commissioners of Japan who arrived here yesterday.

One of the visitors, Baron Kanda, and Mr. Keane were close friends and in his address today the baron paid eloquent tribute to the author. A public reception at noon was presided over by Gen. Michael Ryan and responses were made by Baron Silhanow, Baron Kanda and others. There will be a series of functions up to midnight when the visitors will leave.

A DOUBLE MURDER IN SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—The arcade of the ferry building, crowded with thousands of homeward bound suburbanites was the scene of a double murder early tonight, when Ignace Novak, a Russian laborer, shot and killed Mrs. F. A. Schultz, wife of a Sonoma county rancher and her daughter Betty. Novak fired a bullet through his own head before any of the bystanders could raise a hand, and died within an hour without regaining consciousness.

MIGUEL IGLESIAS, PERUVIAN STATESMAN, DEAD

Lima, Peru, Nov. 8.—Miguel Iglesias, the Peruvian general and statesman, died today, aged 77.

General Iglesias was minister of war in 1880 and took a prominent part in the defense of Lima in January, 1881, when he was captured by the Chileans. He escaped, however, and during the confusion of 1882, assumed the presidency and signed a treaty of peace with the Chileans. The Peruvian general Andre Caceres refused to recognize Iglesias and a civil war followed. Ultimately both the leaders resigned the government into the hands of an executive ministry, pending an election, which resulted in favor of Caceres.

LIONEL BROUGH DEAD.

London, Nov. 8.—Lionel Brough, the comedian, died here today. He was 72 years old. Mr. Brough was born at Pontypool, March 20, 1836. He made his first appearance on the stage at the Lyceum, in "Prince Pretty Pea" on Dec. 26, 1854. Among his known impersonations were Tony Lumpkin, which he played 77 times, and Bob Acres. He visited America in 1884, with Violet Cameron. During his career he played in almost every first class theater in the United Kingdom, America and South Africa.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

Leadville, Colo., Nov. 9.—Henry Miller, son of H. M. Miller, a local clothing merchant, is dead as the result of an accidental shot fired during the progress of a dog fight on the principal street of the city last night. A vicious bulldog attacked a watchdog belonging to Policemen James McDonnell in order to separate the animals. McDonnell drew his revolver and began beating the bulldog over the head. Suddenly there was a shot and Miller, who was in the crowd, sank to the ground with a bullet in his abdomen. He died an hour later. McDonnell at once gave himself up.

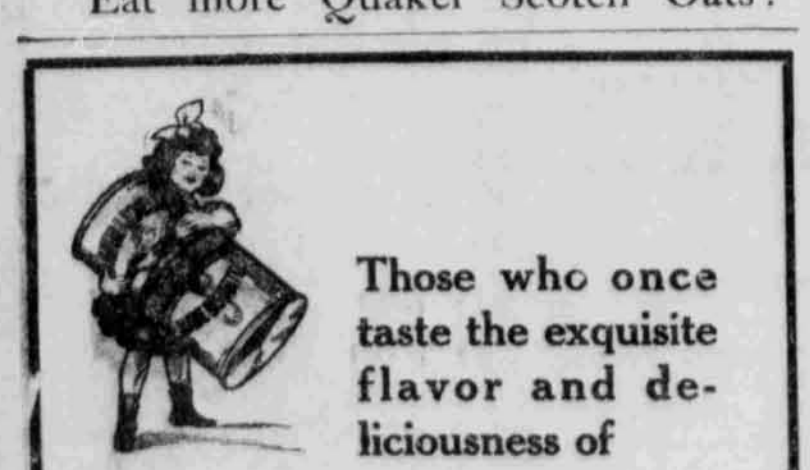
