ALDRICH URGES CURRENCY REFORM

Makes it Plain That His Great Aim in Future Will be to Accomplish This Object.

HE DESIRES CO-OPERATION.

If Delegated to Draw Up a Plan. He Would be at a Loss to Know How to Proceed.

St. Louis, Nov. 8 .- With emphasis even stronger than In his Chicagmosech, Senator Aldrich made it evi ment to the business men of St. Louis woday and tonight that it is his pur pose to devote himself to the one work of reforming the currency system of the United States. He spoke briefly today before a limited gathering of hankers at the Normday club, and more extendedly builght before the Connec-tial club.

SPEAKS INFORMALLY Senator Aldrich spoke informally to night

"I don't come to you with any plan or monetary reform," he such. "In-deed if I should be delegated today indeed if I should be delegated today in-dividually and personally to prepate a scheme for a new system of functor for the country, I should be at a loss to know how to proceed. I should find it necessary to enter upon a careful in-vestigation and would not undertake to formulate anything without much more study than I have been able to give to fine subject. Even in that event I smail want your advice and co-opera-tion, and should ask your aid just as I am asking it now for the commission. "I realize, as I know all of you do, the absolute necessity of reforming the currency upon the broadest nation-al lines. The work to be done cannot be done by any one man nor by any

at lines. The work to be done cannot be done by any one man nor by any set of men; it cannot be done by any one section. It cannot be done by a commission or by Congress without that and of the country at large. Again, also, Mr. Aldrich dwelt upon the necessity of developing a system of

the necessity of developing a system of credit that would protect the country against such dispatrous results as wer against such disactous results its were experienced during the bankers' panic of 1967. He expressed the decided opin-ion that with proper sifeguards the country need not again submit to such a general crash as then was pre-cipitated, with so little reaction.

He was confident that with a suf-ficiently clastic and sufficiently effective credit system, such conditions as arose previous to that disaster could be en-tirely averted or so restricted as to affect only a few plungers and their broughter associates. immediate associates.

WATCHING PHYSICAL CONDITION OF SCHOLARS

New York, Nov. 8.—Statistics gath-ored from 358 cities in 42 states and the District of Columbia by the bureau of municipal research indicate a growing tendency of schools to closely watch the physical condition of their pupils. Of these cities 147 with a school popu-lation of 700,000 are not making any at-tempt to discover transmittable dis-cases; 211 are inspecting for such dis-cases; 214 are inspecting for defective vision; 170 for breathing trouble, and 118 for bad teeth, while 104, with a population of 200,000, have no examin-ation of any kind for their 600,000 school ohldren. Fifty-five cities supply nurses to instruct parents at schoolhouses; 43 send nurses from house to house to to instruct parents at schoolnouses; 45 send nurses from house to house to instruct parents; 97 send out cards of instruction about toberculosis, dental hygiene and dict, while 154 cities co-operate with dispensaries, hospitals and relief societies in the care of school children

MIGUEL IGLESIAS. PERUVIAN STATESMAN. DEAD

Lima, Peru, Nov. 8-Miguel igleslas the Peruvian general and statesman died today, aged 77.

General Iglesias was minister of war in 1880 and took a prominent part in the defense of Lima in January, 1881, when he was captured by the Chiloans. He escaped, however, and during the confusion of 1882, assumed the presi-dency and signed a treaty of peace with the Chileans. The Peruvian general Andre Caceros rofused to recognize issists and a civil war pollowed. Unimately both the leaders resigned the government into the hands of an executive ministry, ponding an election, which resulted in favor of Caceros.

LIONEL BROUGH DEAD. London, Nov. & -Lional Brough, the comedian, died here today. He was it years old. March 20, 1838.
