LOCAL BRIEFS.

New Citizen—Judge Morse yesterday denied Peter Davidson, formerly of Denmark, to citizenship.

Wood Made Happy—Former Asst. Fire Chief Charles E. Wood was made happy this morning by the arrival in the Wood home of a fine baby boy.

Special Service Tomorrow—May, and Mrs. John Willis of the Salvation Army are in town from the east to assist in special services to be held tomorrow by the lost army post.

Farewell Entertainment—A farewell entertainment will be given this evening in honor of Elder Alma Hall in the Cannon ward meetinghouse, as he is about to leave on a foreign mission.

Bank Clearing—The Salt Lake bank clearing for the month of August just closed amounted to \$20,897,292.07 as against \$19,996,329.20 for the corresponding month of last year. The increase was \$900,962.87.

Members Named—Gov. Cutler has appointed the following as members of the state board of pharmacy to fill vacancies: Walter H. Dayton, Salt Lake; B. F. Riter, Logan; John Kelly, Ogden. The first named will serve until Jan. 1, 1910, and the other two until Jan. 1, 1911.

Greek Fined \$25—Gus Kolorurus, the Greek who was arrested for driving a herd of sheep through Parley's canyon, after having been advised to follow the pass over Little Mountain, was yesterday fined \$25 for his offense. He was tried before Judge C. B. Diehl in the criminal division of the city court.

Burke Cochran a Visitor—Grand Sachem Burke Cochran of Tammany hall, and member of Congress from New York City, arrived last evening, and is a guest at the Knutsford en route east from a Los Angeles trip.
