

POOREST PLAYERS ARE WEEDED OUT.

Eliminating Process Brings Better Games in Tennis Tournament Today.

HUNT LOOKS LIKE A WINNER

Has Developed a Return Smash That Can't Be Caught and Wins Its Points Right Along.

The third day of the tennis play is on at Fort Douglas and the men and women are at work beneath a merciless sun that promises freedom from the customary torments. Just why the worst heat spell of the season had to come on the same day as the opening of the intermountain tournament, and turn pleasure into duty is hard to conceive. Now that the preliminaries are partly over, and the hard games preceding the finals and semi-finals, are on interest is growing deeper, and the crowds about the courts larger.

But then a tennis tournament is not a thing for spectators. It runs unendingly from set to set and player to player, so that one who would view it with any pleasure must choose his set and quit after watching that. Easily the most interesting game yet was that the Salisbury brothers yesterday, which required three sets, and a postponement after the second from noon till 5 o'clock to allow the brothers some rest. The Salisbury brothers are both top notches, but the drawings brought them together in the first round, which meant that one of them must stop there instead of at the finals or semi-finals. For that reason a spectacular game was put up in which each did all that was in him.

When the game opened in the morning Walker went after his brother and captured the first set, but not till after he had run over the usual score, and nearly won both players out. In the next set Jimmy did better, but his opponent, playing began to tell over Walker's more brilliant but exhausting efforts. 15 to 11 was the score in this case. In the third set, Jimmy took everything in good calm style. He produced a delivery that had some sort of drop to it and fooled his brother almost every time, beating him by the score of 6 to 1. It was nearly dark when the set was finished. Of the crack men from outside the state Myers and Hunt took on games yesterday, both justifying the claim of being adepts at the racket. Sam Neel did not play but merely held down a seat among the invited spectators. Hunt, who comes from California, passed a terrible series of returns yesterday and took points on almost every set. He conceded that he has a place coming up in the semi-finals for the singles championship, and a chance at the finals. Myers from Wyoming took his singles over G. Badger in the one two order.
