#### Time Devoted to Discussion of Panama Canal.

Washingeon, April 1 .- A considerable part of today's session of the cabinet was devoted to consideration of the sitlation relating to the Panama canal. Satisfaction was expressed, that the French court, by its decision against the Colombian government, had made s possible for the United States to close negotiations with the Panama Canal company for the transfer of its property and concessions to this coun

That no delay of an unnecessary na-ture is now expected was evidenced by a cablegram read by Atty.-Gen Knox informing the cabinet that a meeting of the stockholders of the canal company has been called for April 23. At that time the final action will be taken by the company in the transfer of the

the company in the transfer of the canal property to the United States. When the legal technicalities have been complied with on the part of the company to the satisfaction of Assts. Atty.-Gens. Day and Russell, who are in Paris as representatives of the gov-ernment, the United States will be in a position to pay over to the company the \$40,000,000 for the canal property. At the same time \$10,000,000 will be paid

to the republic of Panama. Of the treasury amount \$30,000,000 is on deposit in New York, subject to the order of Secy. Shaw. The remaining \$20,000,000 will be paid out of the cur-
