RELIGIOUS LIBERTY IN TURKEY.—A correspondent has sent us a statement which tends to prove the good faith of the Turkish government...

At Constantinople a Turk and his wife and child have been baptized by the American missionary, Dr. Hamelin, by the name of "Freeman."

The officers of the Porte examined Mr. Freeman. The object was to ascertain whether he had been driven from Islamism to Christianity by any trouble or supposed wrongs...

Mrs. Freeman was then subjected to the same ordeal, after which it was arranged that the Turkish lady and her daughter should have an interview together.

The result convinced Dr. Hamelin that there was no compulsion in the case, and the ceremony was therefore performed.

The account adds, "It is the will of his Majesty our sovereign, and it has become the established law of the empire, that every subject, without any exception, shall enjoy entire religious freedom."

Two days previously Dr. Hamelin married a young Protestant Armenian to a Turkish lady who had been baptized in Malta.
