

The Senate resumed its labors yesterday afternoon, after the conclusion of the Park memorial services. Two bills were passed, one being Barnes' Senate bill No. 19, which allows bankers to loan 15 per cent of their surplus funds. The present law limits the loan of the 15 per cent to one person. There was a similar bill introduced in the Legislature of 1899, but it failed to get through, after a lengthy debate. The bill, yesterday, however, went right bill, yesterday, however, went right through without a word for or against. The other bill bat passed was Mur-dock's Senate bill No. 28, relating to annual and special takes for schools. The bill was passed under the suspenture, as at present. As the law now stands the different counties have no voice in the appointment of their fruit. tree inspector, but have to pay his salary

Another question brought up was the official court reporter's fees in the various countles. As the law stands now on the statute the court reporters get '\$8 per day, whether one case or any num-ber be tried. But all the county can charge litigating parties is \$3 per day in each case, which is the minimum charge though a case may only consume a portion of the day. When several a portion of the day. When severa cases are disposed of in one day the amounts paid in by the litigants of course covers the reporter's fees, but when a case lasts for several days the counties lose on the proposition. Take for instance the big Jordan water case now being tried before Judge Morse. It has been in progress of trial for about three weeks, and will doubtless last two weeks more. The parties to the suit pay the county \$3 per day, and the

county pays the reporter \$8 per day, re-sulting in a loss of \$5 per day, which, it is claimed, whil not be offset when more than one case be tried on the same day at other times. It was decided to ask the Legislature

ENGINEERING INVENTION.

D. R. Gill Exhibits a Device Both Simple and Wonderful.

David R. Gill, for some time a member of the "News" reportorial staff, has returned from a protracted trip in the East, where he has been in the interest of an invention which he has perfected and which he claims will revolutionize the mechanical world. It is a rotatory steam engine capable of being operated by means of steam or compressed air or even water.

In this engine the steam is utilized as it is in the cylinder of the ordinary reciprocal engine. Unlike in the turbine engines from which is produced such high rates of speed it is impossible for the steam to escape before having accomplished its work. In other words the engine will start with its maximum load, not requiring a speed momentum before picking up its burden. The great and desirable feature in the machine is that it absolutely abolishes what is known as the which Mr. Gill has weighs three pounds and eleven ounces, and the pressure surface in operation-or what in the rotary engine represents the piston head in the ordinary reciprocal engine-is three-eighths by three-sixteenths of an inch, producing one horse When attached to a steam power. pipe in the heating plant of the office, with twenty pounds pressure of steam, an estimated speed of 5,000 revolutions per minute was attained al-though such a high rate of speed is possible it is not necessary in order to make the engine's work effective, because it may be operated just as is the ordinary engine. The friction has also been reduced to such a degree as to warrant the assertion that there is none at all, so that the engine is practically indestructible. There is no use to which power is applied but this rotary engine is capable of operation. 

shall be selected by the trustees of the Agricultural college, and his term of office shall endure so long as it is the pleasure of the trustees. The officer shall also be a professor of veterinary shall also be a professor of vereinary science in the college and his salary shall be \$1,400 per year, the State to pay half and the college half, but his expences, not to exceed \$300 a year, shall be paid by the State. His func-tions shall be to protect the health of domestic animals in the State, and suppress, control or eradicate contagious or infectious diseases. He is to have power to kill animals affected with contagious diseases and the expense of killing and burrying such animals shall be born by the owners thereof.

keep a record of the marks or brands, with the destination, name of consignor and consignee, and other data for identification, which details shall become a tincation, which details records, and for part of the official records, and for which duties he shall collect a fee of \$5 from each consignor. mended passed with certain amend. ments by the committee on judiciary. House bill No. 54, by Harmon, relat-ing to the conditional examination of witnesses, was also recommended by the same committee,

afternoon was introduced by Representative Benner X. Smith before the joint assembly was called to order, but Senators put a quick extinguisher on the proceedings.

The proceeding was in the nature of a resolution presented by Mr. Smith call-ing upon Senator Kearns to wield his influence with President McKinley in behalf of Major F. A. Grant, of the Utah batteries, who has applied for the position of major and paymaster in the United States army. Mr. Smith followed up his resolution

with a short declamation on Major Grant's signal services to the State during the late war.

Representative Don C. Johnson, thought that the resolution was proper, and seconded the motion for its adop-tion. Senator Thomas secured the floor, the only protest he had to offer was that it was discourteous to Senator Rawlins and Representative King not to include their names in the resolution. Smith accepted the amendment, and Representative Van Horne suggested that Senator Rawlins being the senior senator, his name should appear first. But this apparent settlement of the matter served only to give the senators time to collect themselves, when Sen-ator Lawrence, after a hasty exchange of words with other senators, arose and said that he would not say a word to detract from the glory of Major Grant, but he seriously questioned the propriety of the Legislature furthering the candidacy of any one resident of the State, when others are seeking the

same office. Axton grew warm and enthuslastic, and said that Major Grant was the only man in the State who was wholly qual-ified and that the Legislature ought to do all it could to assist him in se the position he was after. Don C. Johnson thought so to.

Senator Sherman said that Major Downey was after the position of pay-master, and it would be unfair to enmaste dorse Major Grant under the circumstances.

Some one proposed inserting the names of all of the applicants, and Senator Tanner suggested that the resolution be referred to the Republican caucus. Senator Love put a quietus on the thing by, stating that the action was

most inopportune, that the joint assem-bly had been called to hear an address by Senator Whitney, therefore moving that the resolution be tabled. The motion quickly carried.
