Boise, Idaho, July 16, 1901 .- The veather of the past week has been warm and bright: excepting light showers in isolated localities of Bannock and 'assia counties on the 12th, and in Nez Perce and Latah countles on the 13th precipitation occurred, and the no precipitation occurred, and the drouth was intensided in the south-eastern "dry farm" districts by dry, hot winds. Mr. C. B. Simpson, Special Entomolo-gist of the department of agriculture, states that now is the proper time to spray for the second brood of the codiing moth. Hay and Grain: Haying has been

commended in the northern countles and has made rapid progress except in some localities where the ground is too wet to admit of rapid curing of the hay; the yield is satisfactory. The first crop of alfalfa is mostly in the stack the southeastern countles, and, where water is available, the second crop is starting well. In the southwestern valley districts, the second crop of alfalfa has mide rapid growth under the influence of warm weather and plenty of water for irrigation, and is coming into bloom.

Grain where well watered has made good progress, and, in many localities is ripening; the hot winds in the southeastern part of the state have done great injury to "dry farm" grain, and the prospects are for a light crop on lands too high for irrigation.

Vegetables and Melons: Potatoes, beets and garden vegetables have made good growth, and, though late, promise satisfactory results. Warm weather has caused rapid growth of melons Stock: The range is still good in the northern and western counties, and there stock is doing well, but in the eastern counties the range is drying, small streams are failing, and in con-sequence, stock is losing flesh.
