**SENATE.**

WASHINGTON, 10.—Whitney was

asked whether he recollects the article in the

Tribune in 1872 regarding the complaints against

post-traders at Fort Sill. He replied

that he did not. He was asked whether,

after the publication of the article

he had any communication from

Belknap, either personally or by

letter, in regard to the authorship

of the article.

To this counsel Carpenter ob-

jected. Whereupon a lengthy dis-

cussion between the counsel for the

defense and the managers ensued.

McMahon, of the latter, stated

his object was to show that the

Secretary of War had made no

effort to look an inquiry into the

truth of the complaints. He said

he expected to show that the con-

duct of Belknap was that of a

guilty man, who was aware of the

existence of a system of extortion

and imposition against the soldiers

at Fort Sill.

The senate refused to allow the

question.

McMahon asked witness whether

he had received a communication

from Gen. McDowell on the subject

after the publication of the Tribune

article. This was also objected to,

but the objection was overruled,

and the witness said he had received

such a communication.

The communication was ordered

to be placed in evidence.

Carpenter, of counsel for the ac-

cused, submitted telegrams from

Gen. Sherman and Lieut. Gen.

Sheridan to the effect that the

presence of the Lieut. General was

necessary in Chicago, and asking

that arrangements be made to have

his deposition taken in that city.

The council for the accused and

the managers agreed that it should

be taken at Chicago.

Caleb P. Marsh was placed on the

stand, and testified as to the pay-

ments made by him to Belknap.

Some were sent by express, others

made by persons in New York. He

was asked to furnish the correspond-

ence between him and Belknap,

which gave rise to a series of objec-

tions by the defense and a spirited

argument. Marsh said he had de-

stroyed all the correspondence with

Belknap.

He said he had forgotten the con-

versation which passed between

him and Belknap when he paid
